

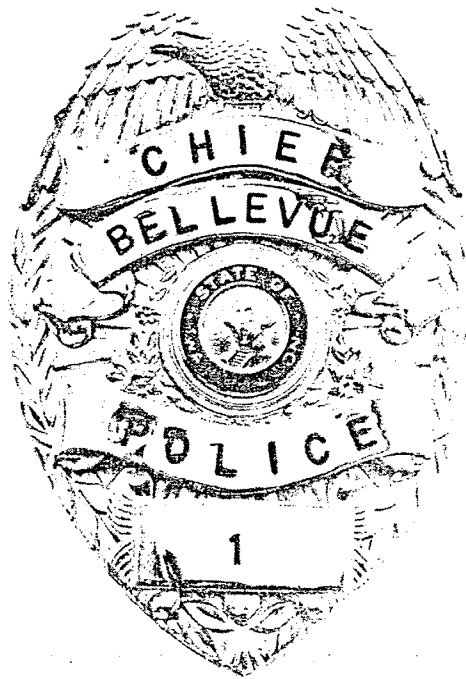

Dear Mr. Miller:

Submitted herewith is the 1969 Annual Report of the Bellevue Police Department.

Once again, this past year has been characterized by rapid growth of the City.

Our scope of responsibility, both in population and geographically, has grown with the City, necessitating increases in personnel. Placing a Patrolman "on the street" involves much more than just hiring a man. Men who meet the high standards demanded by modern Police service are recruited but not in abundance. Training involves eight weeks of intensive Academy instruction for the minimum basic knowledge necessary for the complex duties they are expected to perform. Finally, they must accumulate a level of experience which will enable them to confidently handle any given situation. This takes time. These considerations, along with many others, necessitate a considerable delay between time of authorization of personnel increase and the time the personnel are actually engaged in effective police work.

We are, and for the foreseeable future, will be, engaged in a constant expansion program. It is now our primary task to accomplish such expansion without diminishing the effectiveness or the quality of our present level of service. The key to professional Police operations is good personnel and we intend to recruit, train and retain Officers of whom the City will be proud.

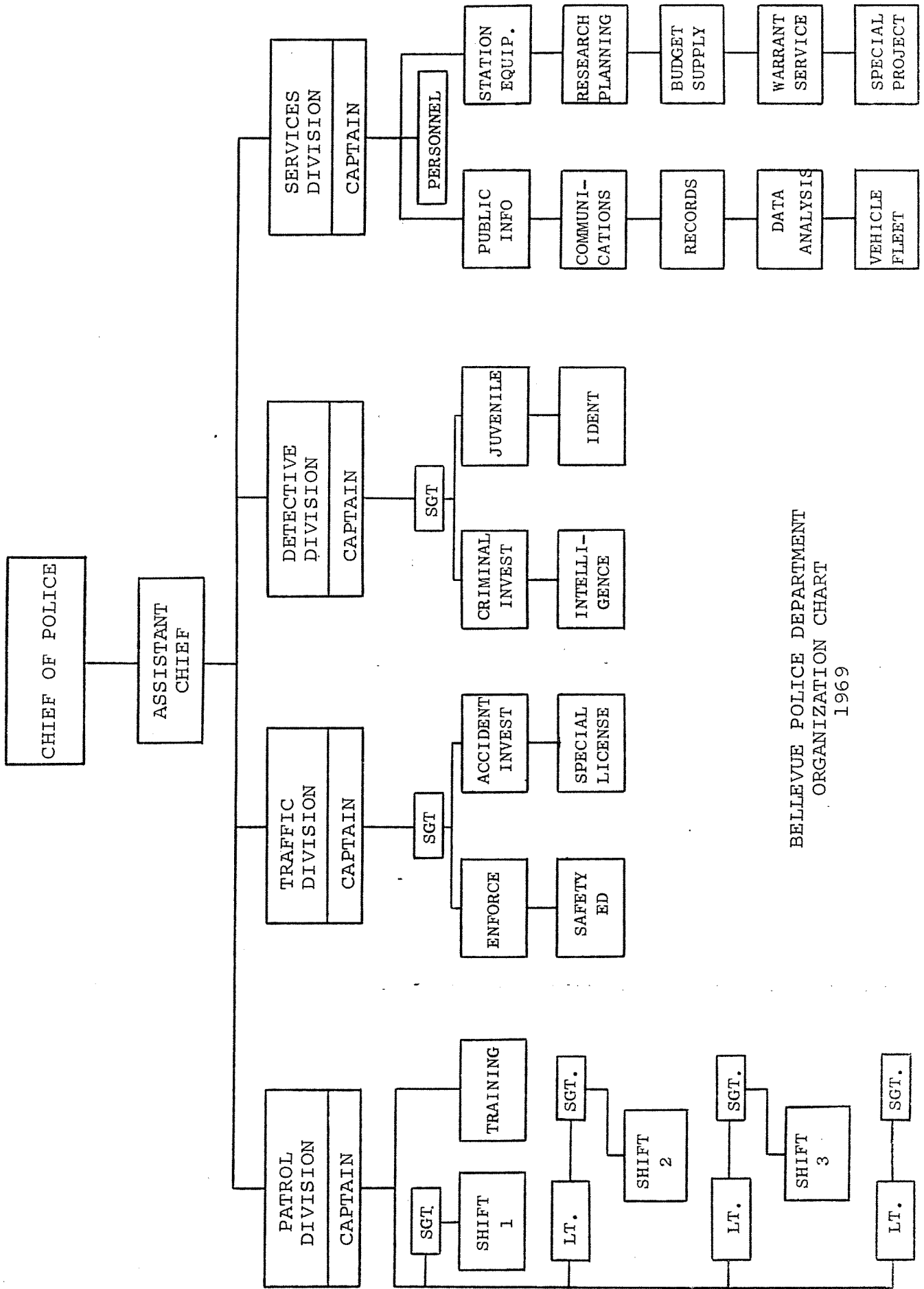

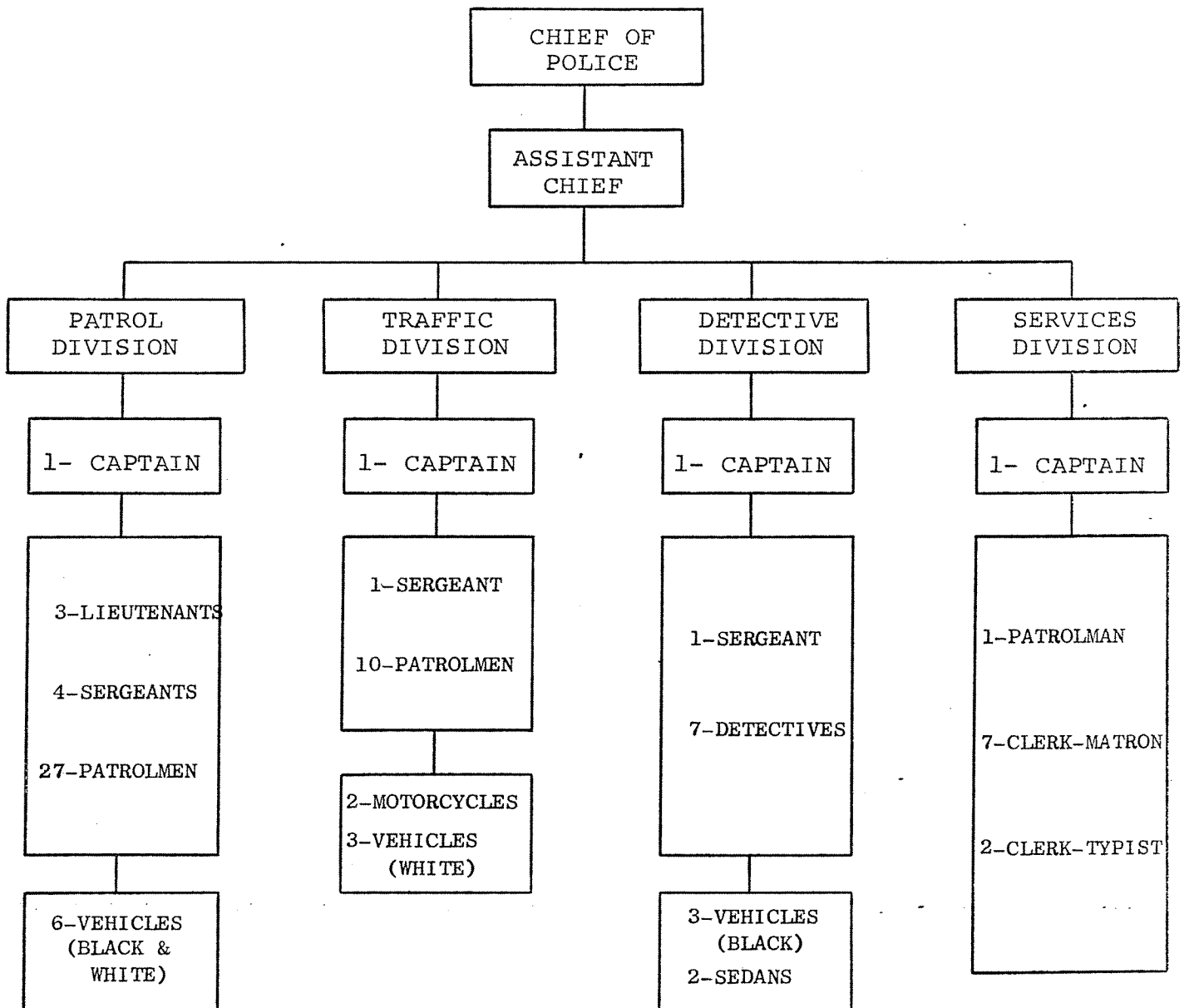

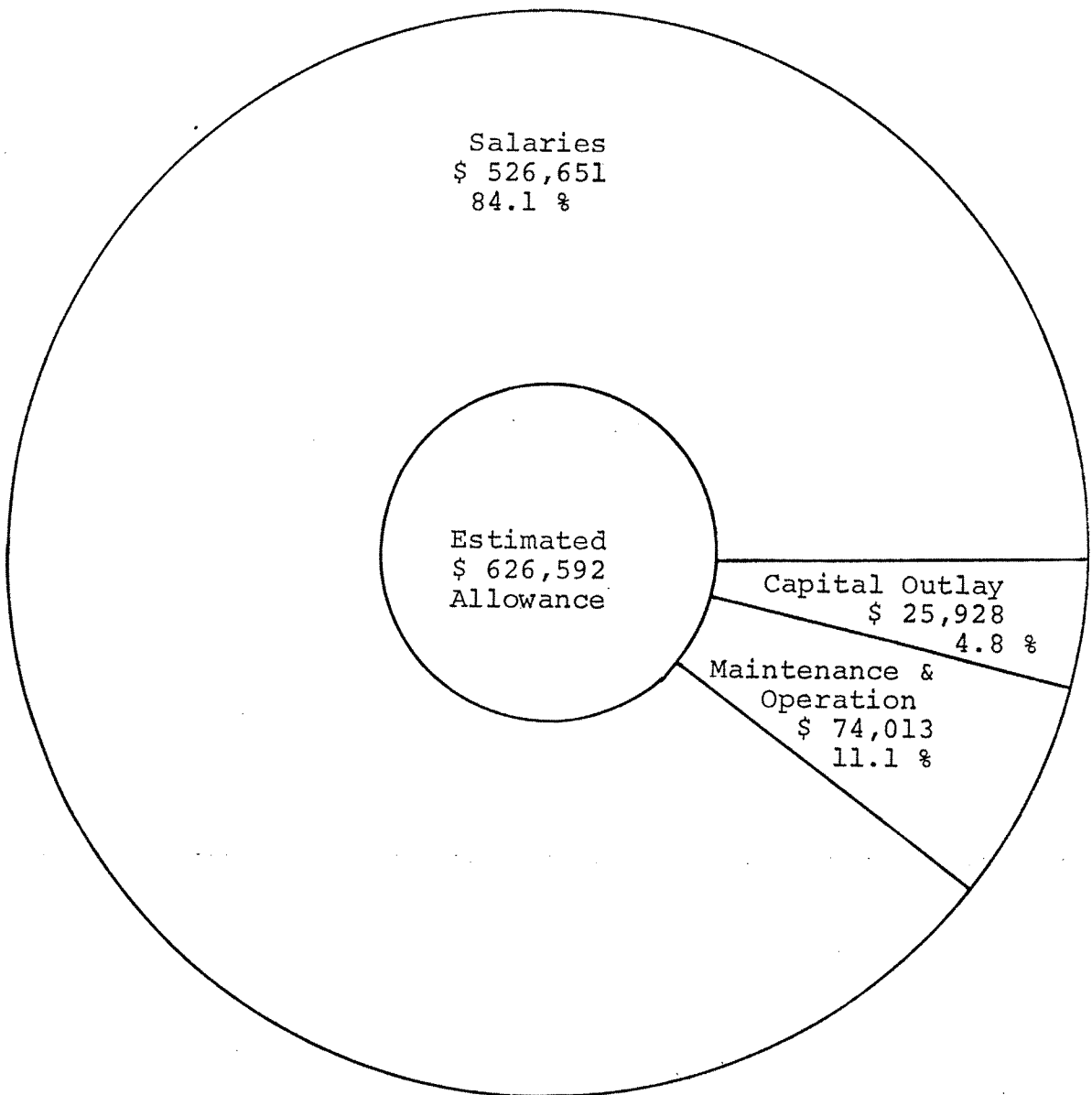

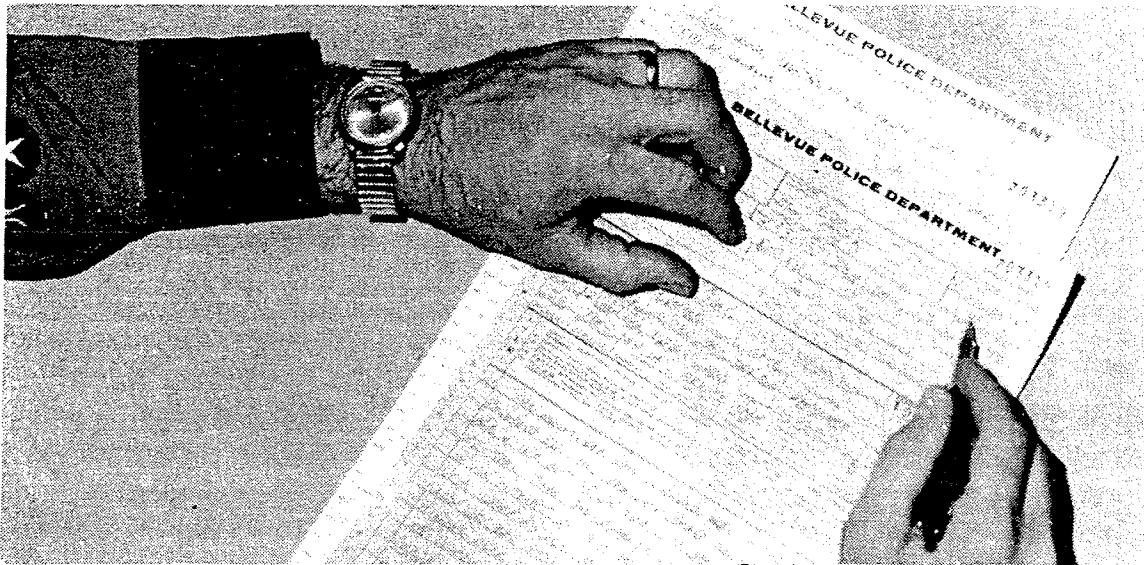
BUDGET ALLOWANCE

The budget allowance of the Bellevue Police Department was \$626,592 and this was 13.2% of the total City of Bellevue budget allowance.

This represents a per capita cost of \$14.10 for Police Services.

1969 Supplement

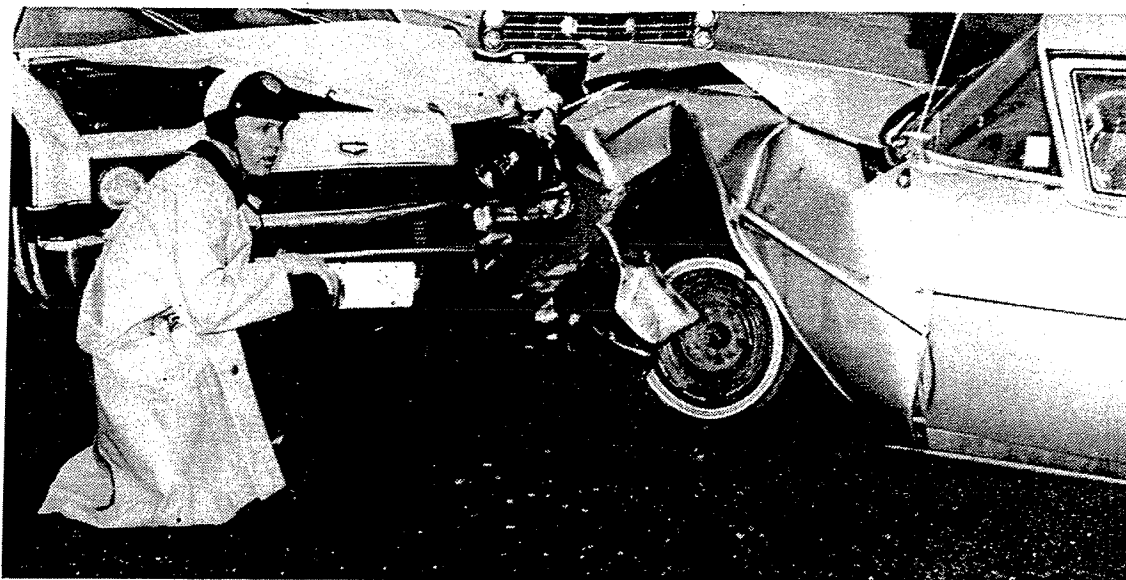
Officer Smith assigned to Patrol Division 10-20-69 for orientation prior to assignment to rank of Sergeant 11-1-69.

November 28, 1969, the department assumed responsibility for the newly annexed area of Lake Hills and Tam O'Shanter.

Officers Stover, Parker, and Brennan were transferred temporarily from the Traffic Division to Patrol Division to enable patrolling of new area until the academy was out on December 15, 1969.

Officers Littlejohn, Mulder, Denton, Skeen, Sperry, and Beckdolt were assigned to Patrol Division on December 16, 1969. Officers Stover, Parker, and Brennan were transferred back to Traffic Division on 12-16-69.
