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



ARBOR DAY –

EARTH DAY CELEBRATION AND FAMILY FESTIVAL 2017

Bellevue's annual Arbor Day – Earth Day event, scheduled for Saturday April 22nd, will be held at Lewis Creek Park, located at 5808 Lakemont Blvd SE. This year's celebration will also mark the city's 26th year of being recognized as a Tree City USA community by the Arbor Day Foundation. The event will include volunteer projects, a tree-planting ceremony, and family festival.

Volunteer Projects – 9-11 a.m.: Approximately 400 volunteers will participate in park enhancement projects at Lewis Creek Park. Projects will include planting, trail resurfacing, and removing invasive species. Space is limited, so register today at Parks_Stewardship@BellevueWA.gov!

Family Festival – 11a.m. -1:30 p.m.: Held at Lewis Creek Park Visitors Center. Local environmental stewardship organizations will host free activities, ranger walks and eco-demonstrations. All ages are welcome! Kids can grab an Arbor Day-Earth Day Passport from a ranger and journey through various eco-stations. After learning about each station, children can have their passport stamped. Completed passports will be entered into a prize-drawing.

Arbor Day-Earth Day Ceremonial Tree Planting – 11:30 a.m.: Bellevue Park Rangers and elected officials will participate in the ceremony and recognize many wonderful volunteers and community groups. A ceremonial tree will be planted.

Family-Friendly Ranger Walks:

Bring the whole family to join a Ranger on a guided hike through the Mercer Slough Nature Park. This kid-oriented program uses games and activities to educate kids and their parents about the Nature Park while discovering the birds and animals that call the Mercer Slough home. The hour-long nature walk ends at the channel bridge in the middle of the park. From there you are able to explore the rich diversity the park has to offer.

Join a ranger to take a short hike through the wetlands of Mercer Slough Nature Park. 

PLANTING A GARDEN HABITAT FOR NATIVE BEES AND BUTTERFLIES




