

- Emerging issues








Planning for 2035

Bellevue Job Growth 2012-2035

Bellevue is projected to grow from 133,400 jobs in 2010 to 185,100 in 2035, an increase of 51,800 jobs.


Bellevue Housing Growth 2012-2035

Bellevue is projected to grow from 58,400 housing units in 2012 to 74,200 in 2035, an increase of 15,800 units.



Land Use & Housing

- Focus most growth Downtown or other mixed-used areas
- Maintain health and vitality neighborhoods
- Address need for affordable housing
- Support for student housing options, including on-campus and in Eastgate corridor
- Regional work to end homelessness



New Neighborhoods Element

- New chapter dedicated to neighborhoods
- Recognizes wide range of neighborhoods
- Supports preserving and developing neighborhood character as city evolves
- Frames how neighborhood plans are updated and relate to overall Comprehensive Plan





Utilities and Capital Facilities

- Strategic, cost effective management of utilities
- Encourage emerging technologies that improve utility service delivery
- Link to Functional System Plans
 - Service level targets, performance standards, and System Operating Policies and Criteria
- Link to Capital Investment Program
 - Investments based on Functional Plans
 - Funding plan for capital facilities for growth and infrastructure renewal





Mobility

Transportation amendments reflect community changes

- Broadly address the mobility needs of a diverse community
- Provide travel options to enhance access and public health, foster economic development, sustain environmental values, improve livability and promote equity.





Economic, Ed & Infrastructure (PC)

- **Economic:** Support an innovation economy and Bellevue's role as an international gateway
- Education: New subsection to recognize value of schools and secondary education
- "Best Idea" for widespread, affordable, high-speed internet access
- Mitigation of new **power lines** and undergrounding of existing power lines





Arts & Culture

- Arts help define the city's character & build community
- Arts bridge cultures/communities and connect people to places
- Facilities: local and regional approach to address chronic facility shortage
- Lifelong arts education: at all skill levels provides broad community benefits
- **Public art:** integral to city character & builds on authenticity







Human Services

- New policies:
 - Making human services more accessible and site services close to public transit
 - Local response to homelessness by providing homeless housing with services
 - Spotlighting the City's role in protecting civil rights of residents through regulatory means (ex: investigating housing discrimination complaints)





Parks, Recreation & Open Space

- Acquiring and developing parks within an increasingly urban environment imperative to maintaining the *City in a Park* vision
- Importance of parks for intercultural gathering and community building
- Identified links between transportation and parks policies



Environment & Stormwater

- Life cycle materials management
- Improving aquatic habitat where it will provide the most benefit
- Value of trees to surface water, energy consumption and aesthetics
- Greener buildings and infrastructure
- Low Impact Development principles for stormwater management throughout the City
