

HISTORY

The department was authorized by Council action when Ordinance No. #8 of the City of Bellevue was passed on April 28th, 1953. The department was activated on August 1, 1953 when a Chief of Police was hired by the city. No actual patroling was done in the city until September 16, 1953 when a Sergeant was added to the department. Acquisition of equipment, the creation of Ordinances and the various paper forms to keep records all had to be accomplished before the department could actively start to work.

January 1, 1954, when two more men were added to the department, a twenty four hour service was given for the first time. The department was faced with a heavy traffic load with close to seventy miles of streets to patrol within a five square mile area. At this time the census showed a population of 5,950.

In April of 1954 the population grew to 7,658. Two more officers were added on the ninth of September 1954, bringing the department personnel up to six. Realizing that the population was still growing and the Law Enforcement program demanding more and more service, three more men and a policewoman were added to the department on the first of January 1955, bringing the number of personnel to ten. A census in April of 1955 showed a total population of 8,901.

With the addition of added personnel in 1955 the desk in the station was in operation twenty four hours a day. Prior to that time all calls for assistance and the notification of cars by radio was handled during the city office hours and when the offices were closed, the operation was coordinated at the Chief's home.

On the sixteenth of Octover 1955, another officer was added to the department and the Juvenile and Crime Prevention division was established.

Two more men were added on January 1, 1956, bringing the department strength to thirteen. This allowed the addition of another car to patrol the business area during the night hours. The population in April of 1956 totaled 10,002.

On the first of January, 1957, four more officers were added to the department, bringing the total personnel to seventeen. During 1957, three civilian clerks were added to the department to enable patrolmen to work outside. One regular officer was not replaced after a resignation, bringing total strength to nineteen. The population had increased during the year to 10,600 because of several annexations, one of which was the Newport area and one south of that area. The city is now almost eight miles in length from north to south.

HISTORY continued

During the period from August 1, 1953 to January 1, 1957, the department work load was increased two hundred to three hundred per cent each year.

The department was faced from the start with a continuing traffic problem and although the city does not have many sidewalks and pedestrians are forced to walk from the shoulder of the streets, fatalities from traffic has been held to a minimum. With the daily rate estimated on January 1, 1957 as between 38,000 and 40,000 cars per day, only two traffic accidents since the incorporation of the city have resulted in fatalities. Two traffic deaths in 1957 has doubled the number since incorporation in 1953.

The department has acquired much equipment since it's inception and expects to acquire more as finances allow. One of these additions allowed in the 1958 Budget is a Radar set.

Members of the department attend school each Saturday morning for two hours and officers are sent to various schools conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation which are held at Fort Lewis. These include training in basic law enforcement, command and fingerprint instruction.

The department now operates four squad cars, which are leased by the city and also operates two motorcycle shifts. All employees in the department are full time regular officers including the one policewoman.

Cooperation of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Washington State Patrol, King County Sheriff's Office and the Seattle, Renton Police Departments as well as many other agencies in the state have all contributed a large share in the progress towards our goal of a good police department. Because of this, the department is very grateful and appreciates the aid given to it.

AUTOBIOGRAPHIES

Chief Gerald L. Plowman, 153 104th. S. E. Bellevue, was born at Freeport, Illinois on September 20th, 1910. He graduated from Freeport High School in June 1928. On August 6th, 1937 he was married at Kentland, Indiana and is the father of a boy eighteen and two girls, fourteen and eleven years of age. He worked for the Railway Express Agency until September 1937. While a deputy Sheriff of Stephenson County he was assigned to motorcycle patrol in the Freeport Park District from September 1937 until July 1, 1941.

On July 1, 1941, he joined the Illinois State Police, completing the Illinois State Police School course on July 21, 1941. After promotion to Sergeant on September 1st. he was assigned to the second session of the police school and served as assistant to the Director. On October 1st. he was assigned to Northwestern University Traffic School. Upon finishing school he was named Acting Lieutenant in charge of District #1 at Sterling, Illinois.

Having passed the Civil Service examinations he became a patrolman in the Freeport Police Department on April 1, 1942. In April 1943 he was placed in the Detective Division and was promoted to Sergeant in 1944. He left the department in 1947 and came to the west in July of that year.

He worked at Lee & Eastes Motor Freight Company until July 1, 1948 when he came to Bellevue and patroled the area until October 15, 1952. Then he organized a company which provided taxi, ambulance and other services until August 1, 1953. On that date he was appointed Chief of Police of Bellevue, Washington.

In February of 1956, Chief Plowman was nominated to the F. B. I. National Academy in Washington, D. C. by J. Edgar Hoover, Director. He entered the school on March 19th. and was graduated on June 8, 1956.

Captain Nicholas J. Giardina, age 37 of 13808 S. E. 1st., Bellevue, is married and the father of a seven year old son and a six year old daughter.

He joined the department on January 1, 1955, was promoted to Sgt. early in 1957 and promoted to Captain, July 1, 1957. Captain Giardina is second in command of the department.

Sergeant George C. Whitman, age 31, 1004 108th. S. E., Bellevue, is married and is the father of two sons, ten and six years of age and is stepfather to a boy age thirteen. Has been sergeant since joining the department September 16, 1953.

Sergeant George R. Quarnstrom, age 32, 721 99th. N. E., Bellevue, is married and the father of four children. He has a daughter age eight, a son age six, and twin daughters age four. He joined the department January 1, 1955 and was promoted to Sgt. on July 8, 1956.

Sergeant Jack L. Allen, age 33, 28 - 100th. N. E., Bellevue, is married and the father of four children. He has a daughter ten, a son nine, a son six, and a daughter two. Sgt. Allen joined the department July 22, 1957 and was promoted to Sgt. December 18, 1957.

Officer Harold F. Corkrey Jr., age 28, Ames Lake, Fall City, Wn., is married and the father of a two year old son. Officer Corkrey joined the department for the second time on December 1, 1955.
