DID YOU KNOW?

TRANSPORTATION

Our mission is to provide a safe and efficient transportation system that supports livable neighborhoods and a vital economy in partnership with our diverse community.

- **Did You Know?** The Transportation Department has installed accessible pedestrian signals at over 80% of Bellevue's traffic signals and is on track to have them installed at all signals by 2022.
- **Did You Know?** Every year the annual pavement overlay program upgrades all curb ramps along the streets being repaved to meet the latest accessibility guidelines.
- **Did You Know?** The Transportation Department has an annual funding program to address accessibility concerns from the public. You can submit comments about accessibility on the MyBellevue app or at BellevueWA.gov/city-government/departments/finance/mybellevue/customer-assistance.
- **Did You Know?** On curbless sections of sidewalk in Bellevue, directional bars help people who are blind or have low-vision avoid road crossings that are not crosswalks.
- **Did You Know?** The Transportation Department utilizes universal design practices in outreach materials, a process that was named a model practice by the American Public Works Association during reaccreditation.
- **Did You Know?** Bellevue's Transportation Department has an entire team dedicated to promoting accessibility best practices for those with disabilities, tracking data and improving performance related to issues of pedestrian access for this population.
- **Did You Know?** Transportation maintenance crews trim vegetation to keep walkways clear and accessible throughout the city.
- **Did You Know?** Transportation staff are available to review routes with anybody who has accessibility concerns. You can submit comments about accessibility on the MyBellevue app or by clicking [here](#).
- **Did You Know?** The Transportation Department is developing a program to add audible messaging to the pushbuttons at crosswalks with flashing beacons. This is helpful for all, but especially useful to those who are blind or have low-vision.
