

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. **Annual Celebration**



This year marks ten years of Cultural Conversations, and you're invited to join with family, friends and neighbors for the sixth annual Evening Forum of



Cultural Conversations called "Just Between Us."

"Just Between Us," is an invitation to lean in and bear witness to three Bellevue storytellers and their cultural journeys. Our speakers will share how the "in-between" spaces in their lives shaped who they are and what they stand for.

Cultural Conversations began formally in 2009-2010. The program was inspired by women who had a desire to increase their cultural awareness and to build bridges of

friendship within the growing community of diversity around them. Over the years, the group has grown



from informal meetings of fifteen women to a more structured program of storytelling, tea and conversation offered six times a year. Today, Cultural Conversations is attended by an average of seventy women at each session. An annual evening program was added to include men as storytellers to reach a wider public audience and for those unable to attend during the day.

What is the secret to the longevity of the program? Long-time residents and newcomers to the area come together to make and renew connections, learn and share in conversation through a variety of cultural topics, and invite participation in building a more resilient community.

The program festivities will kick off with light refreshments on the concourse, followed by storytelling and table conversation. The evening

forum is free and open to the public and welcomes women and men, as well as children age 13 and up. Parking is available in the P2 level of the City Hall parking garage on a first-come basis. Neighborhood Enhancement Program Comes to Crossroads Area

Crossroads Kickoff Wednesday, Jan. 22, 6:30-8 p.m.

This month, the NEP process will be launching in the Crossroads neighborhood area with an allocated budget of \$439,000 for enhancements.

The Neighborhood Enhancement Program (NEP) is a \$5 million, city-funded capital improvements program that allows residents to propose and select projects that improve their neighborhood's quality of life and enhance its character. The program rotates through the city's 14 NEP neighborhood areas, serving two areas each year. Since 2015, NEP has rotated through the Eastgate/Factoria, Cougar Mountain/Lakemont, West Lake Sammamish, Northeast Bellevue, Bridle Trails, Northwest Bellevue, Downtown/BelRed and Lake Hills neighborhood areas.

At the kickoff meeting on Jan. 22, city staff will provide attendees with a brief overview of the program guidelines and schedule, answer questions, and invite residents to share, discuss and submit project ideas. Following the kickoff meeting, each household in the Crossroads area will receive a prepaid NEP Project Request Form in the mail. We encourage all residents in the Crossroads area to use this form or the online project request form on the NEP website, to submit as many NEP project requests as they like by March 4.

Fire Station 10 Open House

Thursday, Jan. 23, 5:30-7:30 p.m.

The community is invited to learn about Fire Station 10, the newest station that will be added to the city network. Fire Station 10 will be located at the corner of 112th Ave NE and NE 12th St. The new station is being built to strengthen emergency response in Downtown, BelRed and Northwest Bellevue. The key to saving lives is response time, and the addition of Fire Station 10 will help us meet the citywide travel time goal of four minutes, with no gaps in service.



The open house will begin at 5:30 p.m. on the City Hall concourse. This is your opportunity to get an overview of the project process, timeline and goals as well as learn about site analysis, environmental, traffic and transportation considerations, and station operations. Residents will be able to view displays and speak with staff and consultants on areas of interest around Fire Station 10.

At 6:30 p.m., the program will move into Council Chambers, and Fire Chief Jay Hagen will provide a brief presentation, followed by a question and answer session with subject matter experts. The community is encouraged to attend, ask questions and offer feedback.

A second public meeting will be held in the spring to present station design concepts prior to the conditional land use permitting process that will follow.

"The Art of Listening" and New Listening Salons

Over the past year, 526 people have taken "The Art of Listening" classes through the Bellevue



Conflict Resolution Center (BCRC), in partnership with King County Libraries. This winter and spring, BCRC continues to offer beginning and advanced classes and has added a new event: Listening Salons!

Listening Salons are monthly opportunities to practice your listening skills with others who are practicing theirs. The salons include mini-lessons and feedback forms to navigate the listening session as well as a question and answer period before and after the listening session. You will have time to practice with three people, or you can stick to one person. BCRC staff and volunteers will be listening in to offer feedback if you want it. It is advised to take The Art of Listening class first.

Classes are taught by Marci McReynolds, manager of BCRC. The Art of Listening workshop meets once a week for three weeks. The Advanced Art of Listening is a two-week course including topics such as how to handle anger and difficult conversations. Here's what one participant said about these classes:

"I believe this class has the power to change the course of our country. I see the major problem we have is no conversation about values. That is caused by lack of listening, on all sides, for insight into other people's fears, issues, concerns, backgrounds, reasoning and functioning. Learning to listen is the very key to our shared future."

150th Avenue SE Corridor Construction Update

Retaining walls, sidewalk finished; Right-turn lane, sidewalk construction at SE Newport Way begins in January.

If you drive along 150th Avenue Southeast from Southeast Newport Way to Southeast 38th Street, you may notice the new sidewalk and retaining wall on the east side of the street.



What comes next as part of the 150th Avenue Southeast Congestion Reduction project, is the installation of a new southbound right-turn only lane and sidewalk on the west side of the street, at the intersection of 150th Avenue Southeast and Southeast Newport Way.

Construction of the turn lane and sidewalk was planned to be finished by the end of 2019. However, due to design adjustments construction is expected begin in early 2020 and be complete by summer.

The new southbound right turn lane will help to reduce travel time in the afternoon peak hours.

Immediately adjacent to the 150th roadway improvements, a 10-foot wide multipurpose path (westbound) and a bike lane (eastbound) will be built on Southeast Newport Way, from Somerset Boulevard Southeast to 150th Avenue Southeast. This work is expected to start in March 2020 and be complete by fall 2021.

Working Together for Roadway Safety

Four of our community members were killed this year while walking or biking on Bellevue streets. The crashes



are sad and preventable reminders of the need for road safety awareness and a review of safety systems.

In four separate incidents in four different locations, drivers struck and killed two people who were walking in crosswalks and two people who were riding their bicycles on city streets. Including a single-vehicle crash in which the driver was killed, there were five fatal crashes last year in Bellevue. That number is more than twice the yearly average in the previous nine years. From 2009 through 2018, 17 people were killed on Bellevue streets.

The increase locally parallels a recent national trend showing more pedestrians and bicyclists killed in 2018 than in any year since 1990, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Vision Zero (<u>BellevueWA.gov/visionzero</u>) is Bellevue's effort to eliminate serious-injury and fatal collisions on Bellevue streets by 2030. One principle of Vision Zero is that these injuries and deaths are unacceptable and preventable.

To implement its Vision Zero effort, the city is taking a systems-oriented approach to safety that focuses on streets, people, vehicles and speeds. That means everyone must play a role to improve traffic safety.

Transportation staff are working to design safer streets and sidewalks and Bellevue Police are enforcing traffic laws. When collisions and even near-misses do occur, we're trying to analyze the data and use it to help make the transportation system safer.

Road users can help, too. Drivers should obey traffic laws, be very aware of your surroundings and other road users, slow down when it's dark or roads are slippery, and stay off the phone while driving. In addition, many vehicle models on the market today have features that can enhance your awareness and safety while operating a vehicle.

Pedestrians and bicyclists should assume they are not seen by drivers, obey traffic laws and consider wearing bright or reflective clothing and using lights at night.

The last time there were zero traffic-related fatalities in Bellevue was in 2010. We want the number to be zero EVERY year. It's a number to strive for in 2020 and beyond!
