Cultural Conversations is a program entering its eleventh season, and has transformed relationships and perspectives among diverse women in our community through education and storytelling. The Neighborhood Enhancement Program is a city-funded program that allows residents to propose and select modest, capital projects to enhance their neighborhoods. The program rotates through the city's 14 NEP neighborhood areas, serving two areas each year. The \$5 million program allocation is distributed among each of the NEP neighborhood areas, according to the number of households in each area.

Next on the NEP list in 2021, are the West Bellevue and Woodridge neighborhoods. West Bellevue will kick off in late January, and watch for NEP to come to Woodridge in early April. Remember to Vote!

Ballots due Nov. 3

To register to vote, you must be:

- ◆ A **citizen** of the United States born here or a naturalized citizen
- A legal resident of Washington state at least 30 days before election day
- ◆ At least 18 years old by election day, although one can pre-register, if 16 or 17, and vote when of age
- Not under supervision by the Department of Corrections because of a felony conviction – not in prison, nor under community supervision

Deadlines for November 2020 election:

- ◆ **Register online** or update an existing voter registration by Monday, Oct. 26. Online registration is very user-friendly and printable registration forms are available in multiple languages.
- Register in person: Tuesday, Nov. 3
- Vote in person: at King County voting centers beginning Friday, Oct. 16
- Vote by mail: At least one week before Election Day. No stamp required for official ballot dropbox or USPS mail.
- Official ballot drop box: deposit by 8 p.m., Nov. 3
- ◆ U.S. post office (USPS): must be postmarked by Nov. 3

King County votes by mail, which means that you'll

receive your ballot and voter's pamphlet through the mail. Ballots are mailed 20 days prior to the election and earlier to overseas and service voters.

Draft Environmental Stewardship Plan is available for feedback through Oct. 16

After a year of community engagement, planning and analysis, Bellevue's staff are proud to share the draft Environmental Stewardship Plan with the community. The Environmental Stewardship Plan includes bold environmental goals that will help the city reduce carbon emissions and become more resilient. To achieve these goals, the plan also includes a range of actions, such as programs to increase tree canopy, incentives for green building and strategies for improving mobility options.

Over the past year, city staff have gathered feedback on these goals and actions from hundreds of community members and stakeholders through surveys, in-person events, focus groups and virtual events. Through each of these outreach opportunities, community members have shared that they want to see Bellevue take bold, urgent action to lower greenhouse gas emissions while ensuring that Bellevue is a livable city for all. City staff have used this feedback, along with technical analyses of cost, feasibility, impact and equity, to create a robust plan with actions for the next five years, which balances environmental action and takes into consideration constraints around the impacts of COVID and economic recovery. The draft plan is now available for community members to read and share feedback. The plan will be open for public comment until Oct. 16, with the goal of city council adoption by the end of the year.

Medicare changes planned for 2021

There are some important changes to Medicare that will be introduced in 2021. The changes include:



- ◆ Greater flexibility for emergency use of ambulances. At the scene of an emergency, a qualified medical practitioner will be able to treat a patient without a requirement of transporting the patient to a hospital. After the initial treatment, an ambulance can transport the patient to a primary care facility, urgent care clinic or hospital.
- Greater use of home dialysis and kidney transplants. Medicare-eligible individuals with End-State Renal Disease will be able to enroll in Medicare Advantage Plans during the Oct. 15-Dec. 7 open enrollment period.
- Establishment of a maximum \$35 co-pay for a 30-day supply of insulin. Part D and Medicare Advantage Plans participating in the Senior Savings Model will have the \$35 co-pay insulin maximum.
- Use of online virtual services by patients without geographic restrictions. Medicare will pay for telehealth visits that are initiated by a patient with physicians and other health care professionals. Medicare coinsurance and deductibles will apply to these services. Medicare Advantage Plans may offer additional benefits that are not primarily health related to chronically ill enrollees. These additional benefits may include home-delivered meals, transportation for non-medical reasons, pest control, indoor air quality equipment and structural home modifications.

Beginning Oct. 15, Medicare participants will be able to learn about changes to Part D and Medicare Advantage Plans at the Medicare Plan Finder website. Information can be accessed by entering the search term "Medicare Plan Finder" into Google, Bing or another search engine.

Once a participant has entered a zip code and possibly a list of the medications, they will be able to see details on Part D and Medicare Advantage Plans.

If you have questions about accessing the Plan Finder website or about the Medicare changes for 2021, you can contact a Statewide Health Insurance Benefits Advisors (SHIBA) volunteer. You can contact a volunteer through Sound Generations at 206-727-6221 or statewide at 1-800-562-6900. SHIBA is a free, unbiased counseling service of the Washington State Office of the Insurance Commissioner.

Lists of the 2021 Part D Plans for Washington State and the 2021 Medicare Advantage Plans for King County will be on the SHIBA website in late October. The website is insurance.wa.gov/medicare.

COVID-19 has brought many changes to our lives, and one of the biggest is that we are all staying closer to home. People are enjoying their neighborhood parks more, supporting local businesses and finding new ways to connect with friends and families. City staff have also been looking for additional ways to connect with residents and have some fun!

We're excited to launch **The Great Bellevue Scavenger Hunt!** This is a virtual game you can play on your phone using the free Goose Chase App. This game gives families and friends a safe and fun way to enjoy time in and around your home, and a chance to explore your neighborhood and our city! And there's a chance to win some city swag.

The game begins on Friday Oct. 2 at 8 a.m. and runs until Friday Oct. 30 at 10 p.m. Teams are encouraged to download the free Goose Chase app and sign up early, but registration can be done any time throughout the game time frame. During each day of the hunt, a set of missions will be released. Teams earn points by answering trivia questions or taking pictures and videos doing the missions. Missions will vary but may include:

- Visiting local parks for nature hunts
- Sharing your favorite local takeout meal
- Showing off something special about your neighborhood

- Enjoying Bellevue's "core" values through fitness activities
- Preparing for emergencies with fun drills
- Getting savvy with safer cleaning practices and non-toxic home tips
- Becoming a zero-waste hero through personal challenges and recycling mania

Auto parts stores help you recycle motor oil and filters.

Now, that's slick!

As community partners, many of Bellevue's auto parts stores will take back - at no cost to you - used motor oil in small quantities and used oil filters from people who change their own car oil at home.

- On average, each participating Bellevue store collects 15,400 gallons of used motor oil from Bellevue's do-it-yourself oil changes each year!
- Nearly 10,000 filters were collected last year from customers bringing their oil and filters in for recycling. Oil filters, even when drained, contain valuable steel and an ounce of oil.

Tip: If you get your oil changed at a fast lube shop or service station, make sure to confirm they recycle your filters, rather than "drain-and-dump" them. While the latter is technically legal, it misses the chance to capture recyclable oil and high-quality steel for return to our economy.

Crossroads pedestrian trail opening





Mayor Robinson and Deputy Mayor Nieuwenhuis officially reopened the Crossroads Trail on the first day of fall. The trail provides a connection between Northup Way and Crossroads Park. Enjoy a walk, stroll or jog along the newly paved and fenced pathway. (Please no bicycles).

New on-demand ride service introduced for Crossroads area



Bellevue and King County Metro launched an on-demand service Oct. 1 called Crossroads Connect.

It serves people in the city's diverse Crossroads and Lake Hills neighborhoods, linking homes, jobs, schools and shopping to Metro bus routes that serve the broader Eastside.

Crossroads Connect provides shared ride connections to frequent transit service and is intended to improve mobility for people who live and work in the service area, which has comparatively lower rates of car ownership and lower household incomes. To promote physical distancing, service is currently limited to one rider or party per trip. Here's how the service works:

- ◆ Booking a ride: People request rides using the Crossroads Connect app (available in your preferred app store) or by calling 1-855-233-6043. Passengers will be picked up in a wheelchairaccessible passenger van or a Nissan Leaf within about 15 minutes. If wait times are long, passengers may be offered a cab ride instead at no additional charge.
- ◆ Where and when: Crossroads Connect rides are available within the service area Monday through Friday, 3-9 p.m. Trips must start or end at the pick-up/drop-off area at Northeast 10th Street and 156th Avenue Northeast, near the B Line Station at Crossroads Shopping Center.
- Connecting to buses: The pick-up/drop-off area is next to Metro's RapidRide B Line station, which connects riders to downtown Bellevue and Redmond. Nearby are stops for Metro routes 221, 226 and 245, serving Eastgate, Downtown and Factoria in Bellevue, plus Redmond and Kirkland.
- Cost and how to pay: Standard King County Metro rates apply; the cost is the same as a bus ride, and includes a free transfer to connecting bus lines.
 Fares may be paid using an ORCA card, cash (exact fare only), Transit GO ticket or a valid transfer.
- Health and safety: Masks are required. At launch, for safety and physical distancing, service is limited to one rider per vehicle; additional riders are allowed if they are members of the same party as the rider booking the trip. King County Metro vehicles are disinfected daily and partitions separate riders from drivers.

The service began operating on Oct. 1 and is expected to run through June 2021. More information is available at the Crossroads Connect web page: <u>BellevueWA.gov/crossroadsconnect</u>

Crossroads Connect is a partnership between the City of Bellevue and King County Metro. It's funded by a \$394,000 grant from the Washington State Department of Transportation and Bellevue's 2016, voter-approved Neighborhood Safety, Connectivity and Congestion Levy. The service is operated by King County's contractor, Hopelink. The on-demand app and software is provided by Spare Labs Inc.
