



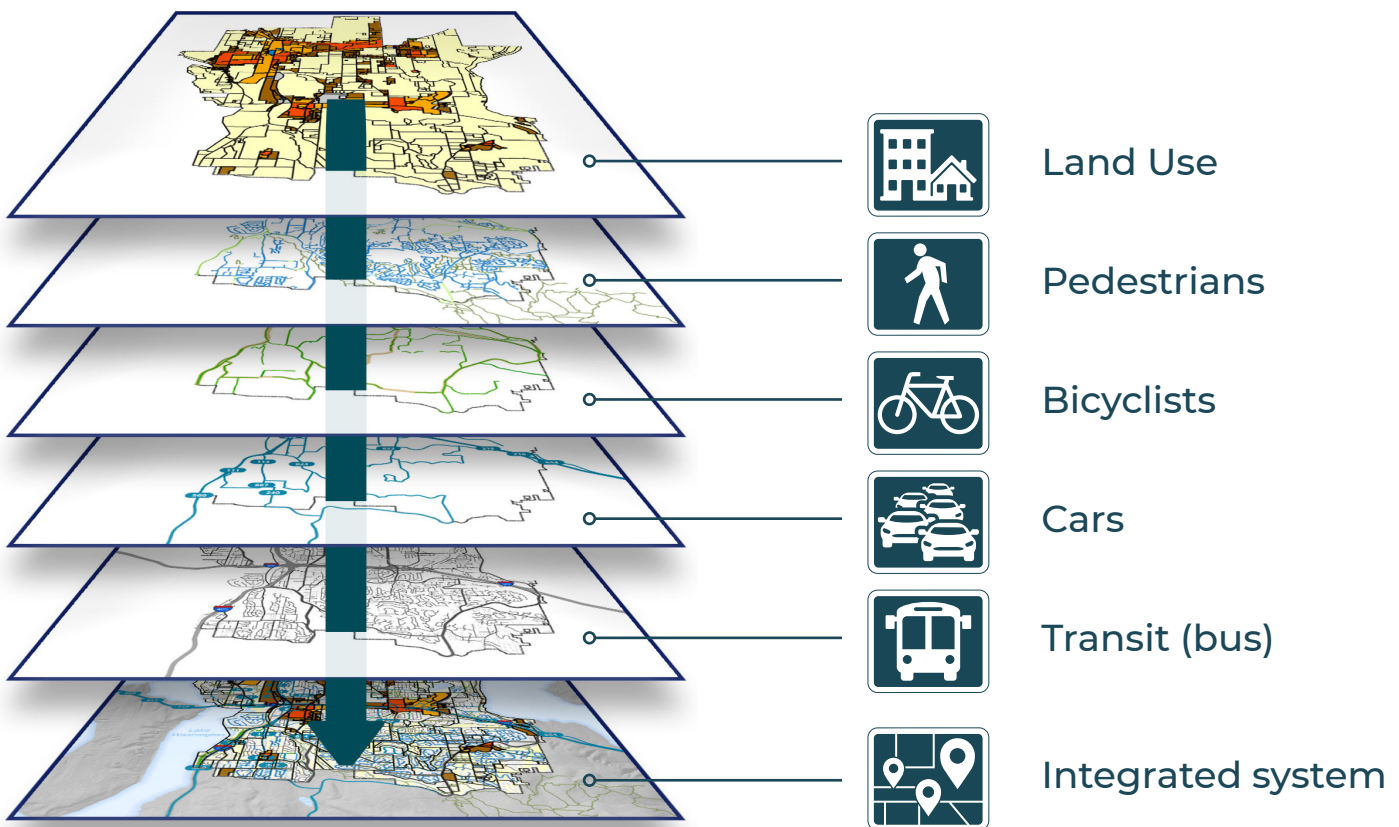
Mobility Implementation Plan Fact Sheet

Bellevue's Mobility Implementation Plan (MIP) is a new long-range planning framework being developed by the Transportation Commission with input from the public, and final approval by the city council.

Purpose

The purpose of the MIP is to ensure that all of the existing transportation plans are compatible with each other and with the city's land use plan. It will help the city make decisions on project investments based on what people want in their transportation system and the quality of life they expect. It will incorporate elements such as multimodal concurrency, equity and sustainability. The integration of different aspects of the transportation system into the MIP is illustrated in the accompanying "layered" graphic.



Key elements of the MIP

Multimodal concurrency

- Concurrency is a state requirement that cities adopt transportation system plans that accommodate anticipated growth
- Bellevue's concurrency standard now only measures vehicle capacity at specified intersections
- Under multimodal concurrency, additional travel modes would be considered, such as transit, bicycling and walking.

Equity

- MIP will integrate equity into transportation planning and prioritize projects to ensure that everyone can get around town
- It will develop an “equity index” with metrics to identify and measure equity
- Metrics could include indicators such as income, language, race, disabilities and others

Sustainability

- MIP will support the city’s goal to minimize the impacts of transportation on the environment
- Strategies include reducing commute trips, expanding mobility options and increasing electrical vehicle infrastructure
- It will Include goals for fiscal sustainability along with environmental sustainability



The idea behind the Mobility Implementation Plan is to consider all users of Bellevue’s transportation system, including walkers such as these crossing 106th Avenue Northeast.
