Neighborhood Leadership Gathering Shaping Our Future: Bellevue's Comprehensive Plan February 17, 2022

Meeting Summary

The Neighborhood Leadership Gathering on February 17, 2022 was held as a virtual Zoom meeting focused on Shaping Our Future: Bellevue's Comprehensive Plan. Mayor Robinson provided opening remarks and encouraged our community to actively engage in the Comprehensive Plan update. Mac Cummins, Director of Community Development and Thara Johnson, Comprehensive Planning Manager, provided and overview of the Comprehensive Plan and the role it plays for the city. The meeting had over 150 community members participate and share around broad themes for what they want Bellevue to look like in 2044.

Bellevue's Comprehensive Plan is the primary policy document that helps to guide the growth of Bellevue into the future. The periodic update occurs every 10 years and provides the community the opportunity to continue to shape the future of Bellevue.

For the next periodic Comprehensive Plan update, work will incorporate the following elements into the update:

- Planning for an additional 35,000 housing units and 70,000 jobs
- Continued focus on transit-oriented growth & development
- Continued evolution of Bellevue as a metropolitan center
- Increased focus on housing
 - Ensuring we have a variety of housing types
 - Ensuring we have a variety of affordability levels
 - Ensuring we have the right housing in the right places.
- New emphasis on equity people have resources and opportunities to thrive
- Increased focus on taking climate action and responding to climate change

A tentative timeline for the process and community engagement was also shared with the community.



During the evening, the community provided written comments on Menti.com to submit their responses to what they would like Bellevue to look like in 2044 – describing Bellevue's neighborhoods, businesses, parks and open spaces, transportation and community. They also provided ideas for city staff on how to broaden public participation in the process moving forward. The complete list of community responses is attached.
