A complete description of the proposal is set forth in the MDP approval issued by the City of Bellevue on August 29, , 2019 (File No. 18-124000-LP) (the "MDP"). The current proposal is to modify the MDP in order to delete a condition relating to a mid-block pedestrian crossing on Bellevue Way.
