Neighborhood Enhancement Program Updates for Newport and Somerset

Newport residents: City staff are currently finishing the scoping phase for the numerous project ideas that were submitted for your neighborhood earlier

this year through the city's Neighborhood Enhancement Program (NEP). Please join your neighbors at **a public open house on June 15 at 6:30 p.m.** at Newport Heights Elementary School, 5225 119th Ave. SE to preview the projects eligible for the program's funding and included on your NEP ballot. You'll then use the ballot to vote for the projects you care most about so they have a chance at receiving funding from the \$282,000 budget allocation. A brief overview of the project scoping process and NEP voting process will be provided. Look for printed invitations and meeting details to arrive in Newport area mailboxes in late May. Somerset residents: NEP kicked off in April with a budget of \$217,000 allotted to your area and now is the time to submit your project ideas for how you'd like the money to be spent.

It's easy to share your ideas! Simply return the postage-paid Project Idea Card that each Somerset household received in the mail in April, or submit your ideas using the online submission form found at BellevueWA.gov/nep. All project ideas must be postmarked or submitted online by Wednesday, May 18.

The Neighborhood Enhancement Program is a city-funded program that allows residents to propose and select modest, capital projects to enhance their neighborhoods. The program rotates through the city's 14 NEP neighborhood areas over the course of seven years, serving two areas each year. The \$5 million program allocation is distributed among each of the NEP neighborhood areas, according to the number of households in each area.

Bellevue is growing, and over the next 20 years, the Puget Sound region is expected to add 1.8 million people. As the anchor of the Eastside, Bellevue is planning for its share of that growth with an eye on maintaining the high quality of life that people enjoy in the city.

The city's Comprehensive Plan is one of the primary tools for proactively planning for this growth. The plan sets out the goals and policies that will guide decision making on housing, transportation, parks, land use and more. People are at the heart of this plan, which is why community engagement is an important part of the planning process.

The entire process will take place over the next two years. In the first phase of engagement, we're looking to understand what people see as the biggest challenges to address and the strengths that we can build on as we work to maintain a vibrant, welcoming and livable city for years to come.

So far, we've heard from over 1,500 people through our mailed and online questionnaire, and during two virtual events. We've also given multiple presentations to community groups and connected with community members at information tables in various locations.

The next scheduled event is the **Bellevue 2044 Open House**. At this **in-person** event, people can learn more about the Comprehensive Plan, talk to the planning team and share ideas through

a variety of hands-on activities. This is a familyfriendly event and anyone who cares about the future of Bellevue is welcome to attend. Drop in any time and stay for as long as you wish.

Explore Bellevue's hidden treasures by bike on the Lake to Lake Bike Ride on Saturday,

June 11, rain or shine. Bring the whole family to this enjoyable, non-competitive ride benefiting the City of Bellevue's youth camp scholarship fund.

Start and finish at Robinswood Community Park, North Entrance, 14915, Southeast 22nd Street.



Start area: Long-course riders (24-mile route with elevation gain) need to leave by 9:30 a.m., and short-course riders (8-mile route, mostly flat) leave between 9:30 and 10 a.m. The course will be marked and well-supported by staff and volunteers until noon.

Kids will begin their ride at 12:15 p.m. The event ends at 12:45 p.m.

Online registration closes at 4 p.m. on Friday, June 10. Day-of registration begins Saturday, June 8, at 8 a.m., while space is available.

Past participants have ridden these courses on all types of bikes. Past participants tell us that bikes with tires with some traction or a mountain bike work best for the sections of the ride with a gravel trail surface.

The event will have bike mechanics on site at the start to assist with safety checks and minor repairs. All riders must wear helmets. **Prizes:** Following the event, all participants will receive an event t-shirt and various freebies at the post-event prize giveaway.

All participants must obey the rules of the road and trail. This ride is recommended for riders ages 9 and older (Greenbelt Loop is most appropriate for younger riders.) All riders under age 18 must be accompanied by a responsible adult on all rides.

Past projects of all sizes have included yard cleanup, power washing, fence/gate/shed repair and painting, green debris and junk hauling, woodround removal and bark spreading.

Now in its 15th year, Day of Sharing and Caring is a partnership between the City of Bellevue and Jubilee REACH, a Bellevue-based nonprofit organization.

A committee representing Jubilee REACH will review applications and select projects.

To protect the health of residents and volunteers, the city along with Jubilee REACH will continue to monitor King County health and safety guidelines.



To be considered for this opportunity to receive help with home projects, residents must own and occupy a home in Bellevue. Home selection is need-based, and residents facing economic or other life challenges are encouraged to apply.

A decade of Bellevue Essentials!

10-week course begins its 10th year on Sept. 28

After two years of Zoom learning, we are excited to bring back an in-person



Bellevue Essentials course experience in 2022 and you can be a part of it! If you have a passion for learning more about your city and local government and want to connect with others

who are interested in civic engagement, then Bellevue Essentials may be perfect for you. The course allows you to join with a cohort of 35 participants and explore the structure, daily operations, policies and processes of Bellevue city



government over the course of 10 weeks.

The Bellevue Essentials program strives to welcome cohorts who are demographically representative of Bellevue's diverse community. The course is designed for people interested in gaining skills and the knowledge of how city government works and how to effectively be involved in their city government. Participants should be committed to the future of Bellevue and to serving their community. They also must live or work in Bellevue.

In this 10-week course, participants will engage with city councilmembers, city staff and

leadership, and learn about the past, present and future of Bellevue through presentations, interactive experiences and



site tours. Participants must attend at least eight of 10 sessions to graduate and must commit to approximately one hour of outside learning per week.

Three information sessions will be held in June to share more about program goals and outcomes. Information session attendees will receive an overview of the program, hear firsthand experiences of several graduates and be able to ask questions. Attendance at an information session is not required to apply, but you will learn what Bellevue Essentials is all about!

Class meets every Wednesday night, beginning on Sept. 28, and concludes with graduation and a 10th Anniversary signature event on Dec. 7. Tuition is \$150, and fee waivers are available to those with financial need. Applications are due by 5 p.m. on July 27.

Free hearing tests at University of Washington

Comprehensive hearing evaluations are available at no charge through the University of Washington Department of Speech &



Hearing Sciences Audiology Clinic.

This is a donation-based clinic providing evaluations for people having trouble hearing conversations or environmental sounds, such as birds chirping or watch alarms. The difficulty may be related to understanding speech in quiet

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places or where there is background noise. The evaluations are also for people who experience symptoms such as hearing noises in their ears or head ("tinnitus"), or ear pressure and dizziness.

Individuals who are at risk for hearing loss due to noise exposure, family history, co-existing conditions (such as diabetes, kidney disease, hypertension), or exposure to ototoxic medications (often associated with cancer treatments) should also consider a hearing evaluation.

Appointments are usually 45-60 minutes. The appointments are with graduate-level student clinicians who are supervised by licensed audiologists. For more information or to schedule an appointment, call 206-685-7400.

Transportation Virtual Open House

Bellevue is changing the way it does "concurrency," which is outlined in the state's Growth Management Act and requires that transportation improvements be made concurrently (at the same time) as development. The proposed code amendments would implement recently adopted policies in the city's Comprehensive Plan and Mobility Implementation Plan to enable a multimodal approach to transportation improvements concurrent with development citywide. "Multimodal concurrency" is a new way for Bellevue to take into account a variety of transportation modes, such as transit, bicycling and walking, in addition to driving.

Street safety assessments focus on three schools

In May, Bellevue will begin the third in a series of six road safety assessments to help make bicycling and walking safer on routes that are near schools. Part of the city's Vision Zero transportation safety efforts, this assessment will concentrate on streets near Sammamish High School, Odle Middle School and Stevenson Elementary School. Students, parents and neighbors are invited to take part.

Those interested in helping can respond to a short online questionnaire or sign up to participate in one of two "walking audits" that will take place on May 15 and 21. The walking audits allow community members to join city staff at key places in the study areas to share their thoughts and experiences as a pedestrian, sidewalk user or bicyclist in those areas. To sign up for a walking audit or access the questionnaire, visit the project webpage at BellevueWA.gov/road-safety-assessments.

In coordination with the Bellevue School District, the city is using road safety assessments to identify safety issues, especially for vulnerable



travelers such as pedestrians and bicyclists. The Transportation Department will analyze results from the walking audits and assessments and make safety improvements on the streets.

The first walking audits took place in January on roads near Sherwood Forest Elementary School and Interlake High School. In April, two more audits were done on streets near Highland Middle School. Several community members participated in the physical walking audits.

In 2023, three more walking audits and assessments are planned for International High School, Newport High School, and a combined audit for Big Picture School, Lake Hills Elementary School, Phantom Lake Elementary School and Tillicum Middle School.
