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Kelsey Creek Farm Fair celebrates city's rural past

Kelsey Creek Farm - 410 130th Pl SE Saturday, Oct. 7, 11 a.m.-4 p.m.

Meet the baby goats and lambs, collect pumpkins and more at the 41st annual Kelsey Creek Farm Fair!

Festivities will include pony rides, pumpkin patch and decorating, hands-on heritage activities, animal viewing, country lane children's play area, pedal tractors, tractor-pulled wagon rides and food trucks.

Free shuttles to Kelsey Creek Farm will run from Bannerwood Sports Park at 1790 Richards Road, and the Wilburton Park and Ride at 720 114th Ave. SE,. The last shuttle will leave the farm at 4:15 p.m.

In 1921, the site of the current Kelsey Creek Park was a farm called Twin Valley Dairy, which produced milk, cream and butter. Nearly 50 years later, the city purchased part of the farm for a city park featuring 150 acres of forest, meadows and wetlands in the heart of Bellevue.

Please note there is not an ATM on site. Some activities have a charge and pets are not allowed in the barnyard area.

Ms. Kristina Anderson Froling, Executive Director of the Seattle-based Koshka Foundation, will present her experiences and insights as a survivor of the 2007 Virginia Tech shooting. Kristina will highlight her involvement and unique leadership role in school safety in a compassionate and heartfelt manner.

Mr. Mark Follman, author of the book "Trigger Points: Inside the Mission to Stop Mass Shootings in America," will share insights from his eight years of research into the history, successes, and challenges of threat assessment. Follman will speak about issues of public awareness, how trained community teams work together to mitigate targeted violence, and more.

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Detective Will Hallifax serves on the City of Bellevue's multidisciplinary Threat Management Team, the FBI Joint Terrorism Task Force and trains on Workplace Violence Prevention. As a Certified

Threat Manager through the Association of Threat Assessment Professionals, Detective Hallifax will address the drawbacks of a solely responsefocused approach to threats. He will delve into how the Bellevue Police Department has adopted the principles of proactive threat management and prevention within a comprehensive safety plan. He will also present a vision for publicprivate engagement to collaboratively combat threats within our community.

Building A Livable City for All

Drafting the Plan: Comprehensive Plan Update kicks off next phase

The Periodic Update to the Comprehensive Plan launched in February of 2022. Since that time the planning team has gathered a wealth of public input using a variety of approaches. Highlights from the engagement include:

- Mailing a Bellevue 2044 questionnaire to every household in Bellevue.
- Hosting 14 community workshops and open house sessions.
- Organizing 19 tabling events and markets and community celebrations.
- Giving 14 presentations to community & neighborhood groups.
- Arranging 7 focus groups.
- Hearing from over 1100 Bellevue residents in a statistically valid survey.

Information gathered has been used to inform options for how the city will grow and develop in the next 20 years. It is also being used to develop draft policies that will guide this growth and development.

The next phase of engagement will focus on sharing draft language and potential policy changes with the community. The planning team will be looking to hear what resonates with community members and what changes or additions should be considered.

Community Members are invited to join the planning team for a **Bellevue 2044 Phase 3 Kick-Off on Tuesday, Oct 10 at 6:30 p.m.** At this virtual session the planning team will review the process for drafting the major update to the Comprehensive Plan and the opportunities for engagement. There will be time for questions and answers. People are encouraged to register at bellevue-2044-draft-plan.eventbrite.com.

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As part of this phase of engagement, the planning team is also excited to launch a series of open houses where community members can review draft vision statements, speak with members of the planning team, and provide feedback. These are drop-in events and people can stop by any time and stay for as long as they'd like within the event timeframe.

Bike Bellevue interactive online feedback tool is open

Bellevue's Transportation Department is collecting your input for the Bike Bellevue initiative, which will add bike lanes to streets in the urban core areas of Downtown, Wilburton and BelRed neighborhood areas. The goal is to create a network of safe and comfortable cycling connections for people of all ages and abilities.

You can share your thoughts through Friday, Nov. 17, on the proposed designs for each Bike Bellevue corridor using an interactive online feedback tool. You will also be able to see comments from other people, add a response, and agree or disagree.

Lake Hills Sewer Relining Project

King County contractors will continue working on construction of sewer improvements this October. The construction crews are rehabilitating existing pipes on the east side of the project. Construction work will take place in the project area through October 2023.

Here is what you will notice:

- Construction on the west side of the project area along 120th and 124th Avenues Northeast has been completed! Drivers, pedestrians and cyclists have restored access to normal activities along 120th Avenue Northeast.
- Intersection closed at Northeast Spring Boulevard and BelRed Road through October 2023. Access to businesses on Northeast Spring Boulevard up to the closed intersection with Bel-Red Road is maintained via a detour from 136th Place Northeast. Drivers must use the approved detour and cannot use private property driveways to avoid closures.
- Extension of eastbound closure of Northeast Spring Boulevard, between 130th Avenue Northeast and 136th Place Northeast. No vehicle or bicycle access on the eastbound side through October 2023. Westbound Northeast Spring Boulevard will remain open to westbound vehicles and pedestrians.
- Intersection closed at 134th Avenue Northeast and Northeast Spring Boulevard.
- Detour signs posted to direct traffic around construction.

What to expect:

- Typical work hours are 7 a.m.-7 p.m. weekdays with occasional night and expected weekend work.
- Expect traffic detours; equipment staging; and closures of streets, sidewalks, trails, bus stops, driveways, and bike lanes.

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- There will be noise and odor from the temporary pumping system and other construction activities.
- Sewer service will be maintained throughout the project.

Participate in the online open house for the Northeast Spring Boulevard, 124th to 130th Avenues Northeast project

The Bellevue Transportation Department is working on the preliminary design to create a new multi-modal connection on Northeast Spring Boulevard between 124th and 130th Avenues Northeast. Currently, the project team is analyzing options to determine the proposed design. Proposed solutions will consider the effects on future private development in the area, stream and wetland impacts, connections to nearby transit stations, the BelRed roadway network and existing pedestrian and bicycle facilities.

We want to hear from you! Beginning Oct. 2, 2023, we invite you to participate in our Engaging Bellevue questionnaire and share your thoughts on proposed designs. Your feedback will inform the next phase of work, which includes selecting the preferred alternative and advancing it to 15% design.

Project benefits include:

- Improving access, circulation and mobility by making an important multi-modal east-west connection for people who walk, roll, take transit, or drive in the BelRed area.
- Connecting Northeast Spring Boulevard's existing east and west segments to complete the corridor from downtown Bellevue to the revitalized BelRed area.
- Adding sidewalks, bicycle facilities, street lighting, landscaping and irrigation, storm drainage, water quality treatment and other underground utilities.
- Creating an elevated structure to span over the wetlands and the West Tributary to Kelsey Creek.
- Integrating with the proposed future West Tributary Park and connecting trails.
