I bicycle to Bellevue on a regular basis, and would love to bicycle to Bellevue more often, but even as a confident rider, I often simply do not feel safe enough to get to a lot of the places I want to go in Bellevue by bike, so instead I get in my minivan. This adds to parking and traffic congestion in Bellevue, as well as increasing my carbon footprint.

It's come to my attention that Bike Bellevue appears to be stalling. This must not happen.

I am writing to share my opposition to Bike Bellevue, the City's plan to add 15 miles of bike lanes for \$18.6 million, 11 of those miles created by taking and converting vehicular travel lanes in Downtown, Wilburton and Bel-Red.

For most of the plan's proposed locations, adding bike lanes requires removing at least one full vehicle traffic lane. According to the City's own estimates, this would result in 210 daily new bike trips by 2035 throughout the project area, representing a marginal increase in bicycle mode share, from 0.8% to 0.9%. Notably, none of these new trips are anticipated to be made by commuters.

Existing traffic conditions in the proposed areas are already challenging and expected to worsen as the City expects 30,000 new residents and thousands more accessing Bellevue for work in the decade to come. The addition of bike lanes, particularly when better and safer alternatives exist and have been identified in past plans, is likely to worsen traffic congestion, introduce unsafe complexities to streets and intersections, and make Bellevue a less accessible and welcoming place that many will simply choose not to visit at all.

I urge you to reject Bike Bellevue projects in their current form and advocate for more costeffective and safe alternatives that do not require taking vehicular lanes from the majority of the traveling public.

Community & Pedestrian Safety, PEW Update, & Town Hall Recap

March 4, 2024

Dear Neighbors,

We live in a diverse community with many voices and experiences, and this enriches my legislative work. I am proud to be the first elected Indian American woman in the most diverse House chamber in Washington history.

I recognize the value of having different voices enrich our public discourse, as they resonate with diverse stakeholders and therefore influence policy development across our entire community. Recently, our Indian-American community was shaken by the tragic death of Jaahnavi Kandula, a young student from India, who was killed by an officer driving 74 mph in a dense urban neighborhood on his way to a call. The incident was compounded by subsequent <u>callous remarks</u> that minimized the loss of a community member, and eroded faith in the impartiality of law enforcement personnel.

Like many in the Indo-American community, I was also young immigrant and student when I arrived in Seattle to study at the University of Washington in 1988, so this tragedy hit close to home. As a legislator, I look forward to continuing to work on policy to rebuild trust and support police services that we all value and rely upon.

The legislature has prioritized major police reforms that improve accountability and transparency in police practices and have expanded efforts to address pedestrian safety. Information on these efforts is included in this update and I will continue to provide additional updates in a future newsletter. As we all know, community safety, accountability, and support for responsible public safety are needed in balance and impact all of us.

Prioritizing Pedestrian Safety

King County, especially <u>Seattle</u>, faces a rise in pedestrian and cyclist fatalities. This alarming trend demands improved safety measures, particularly at the state level. The data shows disproportionate deaths in disadvantaged areas and highlights the crucial role of reduced speed limits, with <u>fatalities doubling</u> at 30 mph compared to 20 mph.

Recent tragedies such as the death of Jaahnavi Kandula underscore the urgency of these policies. Proposed bills like <u>HB 1582</u> and investments in speed safety cameras and for bicycle/pedestrian projects are positive steps, but more is needed.

Moving forward, Washington needs to:

- Review laws governing excessive speeds for emergency vehicles.
- Provide guidance to municipalities for redesigning streets: lower speed limits, reduce lane numbers, and improve crosswalk signals.
- Invest in marked crosswalks with clear signage, signage, and flashing beacons.

Prioritizing pedestrian safety isn't just about saving lives; it's about creating healthier, more vibrant communities. This is a strategic investment in Washington's well-being and economic vitality. Let's work together to make our streets safer and accessible for everyone.

Community Safety

I am proud that our local law enforcement in the 48th district has worked to continuously build higher standards and to engage with community. And in recent years, our state has also made significant strides in ensuring public safety while addressing fairness and accountability. Recent legislative efforts have focused on the following key areas including:

- Promoting representative policing to support the development of diverse police forces that better represent the communities they serve. Initiatives such as <u>regional police</u> <u>academies</u> and <u>diversifying recruitment within Washington State Patrol</u> represent meaningful progress down this path. Additionally, <u>mental health supports</u> for first responders and <u>flexible work schedules</u> will assist with the recruitment and retention of an inclusive police force.
- Ensuring accountability: New legislation prohibits harmful police conduct by <u>clarifying</u> <u>police use of force policy</u>, <u>establishing less-lethal alternatives</u>, and allowing an <u>independent body</u> to investigate complaints creating a neutral forum for addressing concerns.
- Prioritizing de-escalation: Through training and policy changes, we're emphasizing <u>de-escalation tactics to minimize the use of force</u> and prioritize peaceful resolutions. Current bipartisan legislation like <u>Senate Bill 6009</u> would build on this work by banning the dehumanizing practice of hogtying.

These efforts are backed by substantial investments in law enforcement in the 2021-23 biennial budget, 2022 supplemental budget, and 2023-25 biennial budget. We've allocated funding for recruitment, training, officer well-being, and alternative response programs like crisis intervention teams.

Through continued collaboration, I remain committed to creating a safer, fairer, and more equitable future for all.

Committee Update

Over the past month, both chambers of the Legislature have been diligently reviewing bills in committee hearings. As Chair of the <u>Postsecondary Education & Workforce Development</u> (<u>PEW</u>) <u>Committee</u>, I am pleased to provide an update on the Senate's efforts to address achievement gaps and disparities in higher education and workforce development:


- <u>Senate Bill 5815</u> establishes the Physician Assistant Compact, enhancing healthcare access through telehealth options for rural, underserved, and urban communities.
- <u>Senate Bill 5904</u> aims to align financial eligibility for federal and state aid programs.
- <u>Senate Bill 5953</u> supports reentry and reduced recidivism by allowing incarcerated individuals to access federal and state financial aid grants for postsecondary education programs.
- <u>Senate Bill 6296</u> fosters collaboration to create more retail career opportunities through short-term certificate programs, leading to higher pay and promotions for employees.

I am proud to announce that the Senate has unanimously passed <u>House Bill 1950</u>, along with House Bills <u>2112</u> (concerning opioid and fentanyl prevention education) and <u>2214</u>. I extend my appreciation to Chair Nobles for her <u>remarks on passage of HB 1950</u>, and her support and advocacy on these important bills.

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Town Hall Recap

As we approach the end of the 2024 legislative session, there remains much work to be done. I extend my gratitude to all who have actively participated in civic engagement, particularly those who joined Rep. <u>Walen</u>, Senator <u>Kuderer</u>, and me at our town hall on February 17th.



Your input on various issues such as affordable housing, student loan debt, medical debt, rental assistance, artificial intelligence, and support for families on fixed incomes has been invaluable. I remain excited to connect with you more once the legislative session concludes in March.

Looking Ahead

With three budgets passed through the House, our focus now turns to reaching a compromise with the Senate. Our budget team is diligently working to deliver a final package that reflects our shared values and invests in the people of Washington. I look forward to sharing the results of this important work.

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Hello Councilmembers and Commissioners,

My name is Lara Gardner and I live in Lake Hills near Crossroads. I am distressed that I do not have time to craft a public comment and deliver it at tonight's council meeting. I will instead describe what I just experienced and how it relates to Bike Bellevue, Vision Zero, and our climate goals.

I had a batch of errands to run just now - 3 miles to pick up meds from my pharmacy, and 1 mile to drop off my ballot at my nearest drop box. I have been busy all day and couldn't head out until around 4:30 - right in the middle of rush hour. This is a common occurrence for me.

I debated riding my bike, but the thing that blocks me every time is the hostile roads that immediately surround where I live. My options are 164th or 156th from Crossroads to Microsoft, neither of which have bike facilities to get me where I needed to go without cars honking at me, experiencing severe anxiety, or fearing for my life. I chose my car.

Instead of cruising past traffic, getting some exercise and fresh air, and experiencing the mood-boost that I get when I can travel outside of my car, I sat in and contributed to congestion, feeling helpless and frustrated and anxious, disconnected from the people and environment around me.

There is not enough room on our streets for every individual to drive a personal vehicle everywhere they need to go. Our status quo is unsustainable and deteriorating. If we do not reallocate the space we have to other modes, congestion is guaranteed to get worse as our city grows. There are lots of people like me who wish they could get around without a car but are not supported to do so by our built environment. All of these individuals add cars to the road. With viable alternatives to driving, those who choose to continue to drive will have fewer cars in their way. Bike lanes are good for everyone.

The smartest thing we could do to alleviate congestion in Bellevue is to reallocate the space we have currently devoted to the least efficient and most harmful mode of transportation - in terms of physical space, environmental impact, danger to humans and animals - and enable and empower people to get around in other ways. This isn't about forcing people out of cars, it's about enabling them to have a choice. Currently in Bellevue, there is no choice. We are forced to be dependent on cars in every neighborhood besides downtown.

Cities worldwide are experiencing this same problem, and many of them are choosing to invest in creating viable alternatives to driving by reallocating road space. I know a lot of you seem to view "taking a vehicle lane" as a tradeoff or a negative, but cities that are doing this

are not only getting infrastructure out faster than if they had to acquire new right-of-way, they are also slowing traffic, saving lives, reducing emissions, and boosting local business all with the same project.

Using the data provided by our city's professional transportation engineers, we are talking about trading seconds of vehicle delay to protect human lives, improve mobility in the city, and reduce VMT. How much does the city of Bellevue value human life? Are we willing to take bold steps to change the status quo, or are we going to continue to drag our feet as serious injuries and temperatures rise? We should have started building this infrastructure a decade ago. Will we be proud of the decisions we're currently making a decade from now?

This isn't a new concept, we don't need to reinvent the wheel, we can look to other cities to see how they have had success. They do it by implementing a city-wide network. They do it by reallocating existing travel lanes and piloting low-cost, rapid-build projects to see how it impacts the system, studying and gathering feedback along the way. Until there are pilots on our streets, collecting feedback is a waste of effort and funds.

"It's interesting, when you look at these roads that are 45 mph suburban highways and they get a complete streets treatment, and they're no longer 45 maybe they're 30 but they've got sidewalks, they've got bike lanes, EVERY SINGLE TIME that happens, the businesses along that stretch of road see an increase in economic activity." (39:15)

In the same video he mentions: -25% of Washingtonians don't drive -the cost to the WA economy from crashes is \$20 billion per year -the cost to the WA economy from traffic congestion is \$2 billion per year

Recently a car on a neighborhood street <u>crashed into the side of a medical building in Lake</u> <u>Hills Village</u>, destroying expensive X-ray equipment and causing a gas leak. A car <u>crashed in</u> <u>downtown Bellevue</u> destroying expensive traffic signal equipment. Hundreds of thousands of dollars, and an existential reminder to residents that our city prioritizes the movement of vehicles over protection of human life and property. These are some of the invisible costs of roadways that enable and encourage reckless driving. We need to calm our streets and roads.

And I'm out of time to spend on this email. Thank you so much for your work and your consideration. I wholeheartedly believe that this is the way to make Bellevue more livable for everyone, drivers and non-drivers alike.

Thank you for your service to our community. By way of background, I'm a 50+ year resident, and 20+ year small business owner in Bellevue. I served on the Transportation Commission for 8 years. During my service on the Transportation Commission we drafted the current Ped Bike plan and I served on the Bel-Red Steering Committee. Additionally, I consider myself a bicyclist.

I urge you to revise the Bike Bellevue initiative to not remove any general purpose travel lanes. Removing lanes will come at the detriment of the vast majority of the traveling public for the betterment of a extremely small segment. Current plans provide for dedicated bike lanes in the Bel Red area on Spring Blvd, 120th Ave, 124th Ave, and 130th Ave. Along with the addition of the Eastrail and the improved 520 trail. <u>If</u> additional capacity and or options are needed for the few cyclists, these facilities should be added without removing the general purpose travel lanes.

The Spring District plan provides for much high density in both office and multi-family dwellings. This increased density will have a significant impact on the road system in this area. Reducing the road capacity will reduce the mobility in this and the surrounding areas. With increased traffic in the Bel-Red area we will see people use surrounding neighborhood streets more to try and avoid getting snarled up in clogged roads.

From a cycling perspective, even with dedicated facilities the speeds and traffic on the NE 12th/Bel-Red Road and NE 20th/Northup are uncomfortable to ride a bicycle on. I am glad to see that City Attorneys Gerla and Kline have cleared Franz Loewenherz of unethical conduct accusations. These ill-founded accusations appear to have been motivated by a desire to stop development of safe, multimodal transportation alternatives in the city.

It's becoming more common in this country to attack individuals when you have no real basis to criticize policy. I shouldn't be surprised to see this same pattern happening locally, where council races now cost almost twice as much as total salary over four years, but I do find it a sad trend. Please see attached our comment regarding the City's concerning projections for intersections throughout our City – 16 of which are projected to exceed (or fail) their performance metric under the Preferred Alternative's 2044 growth scenario. This number climbs to 70 under the full build-out scenario. These Comp Plan FEIS projections do not account for the impacts of Bike Bellevue, which would impose road diets and worsen these already difficult traffic conditions.

To better understand what people would actually experience in terms of travel delays under the Preferred Alternative in both scenarios, we worked with our transportation engineers to convert volume/capacity (V/C) ratios to average delay <u>times</u> and have attached that chart as well - I hope you find it helpful.

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Hello Council!

I gave this comment at last Thursday's Transportation Commission meeting and I wanted to share it with you all too. I have such limited time and bandwidth for communication with the city, a lot of it due to high anxiety, but there is so much more I'd like to share with you. I hope I can muster the energy to get some of it down in emails to share with you soon.

Hi - my name is Lara Gardner and I have been a homeowner in Lake Hills since 2017.

I'm here to support Bike Bellevue, which seems to have been removed from all upcoming calendars with no information available. Our community desperately needs this infrastructure, in its entirety and more, and we needed it yesterday. We are facing a climate emergency, an affordability crisis, and increasingly hostile roadways that are more congested every day.

Meanwhile, Bellevue is planning for thousands of units of new housing - many of which are already under construction or opening soon. Without viable alternatives to driving, these new residents will have no choice but to bring cars with them and will only add to the traffic, danger, and emissions impacting all of us. A single light rail line without safe connections to destinations is not a viable alternative to driving.

Some people seem to be concerned about losing car lanes, particularly on BelRed, the corridor that I personally would prioritize highest. I would like to try to help you see the situation from another perspective.

In January, a friend and I spent a few hours walking around the BelRed station area. Bellevue talks about the redevelopment here to be a vibrant, art-centric mixed-use urban village and destination, with light rail at its core.

I encourage you to walk around this neighborhood today and imagine this transformation, and imagine it as if it was your own home. A lot of the new infrastructure is really great, you can tell that we have a world-class team of professionals working hard behind the scenes.

Walk from Mox Boarding House on BelRed Rd to Mercurys Coffee on Northup Way and observe how this exciting new neighborhood is bounded by two of the most hostile roads in our city. So many businesses taunting you from across the 5-lane thoroughfare of vehicles that are driving nowhere close to the signed 35mph. Imagine your bedroom overlooking BelRed or Northup and the sound of street racers keeping you up at night. Imagine the air quality and the ambient noise level and the associated health impacts. Try walking to your nearest bus stop

and waiting at the curb-tight sidewalk with only a narrow gap of air between you and speeding vehicles. Imagine doing this with young children. Imagine walking your dog or pushing a stroller or using a mobility device here. Imagine kids growing up here, without a safe space to be a kid outside of their front door.

Now imagine that the city is proposing reallocating some of this hostile space to enable less negatively impactful modes of transportation, with treatments that will naturally slow speeding cars. Does it still feel like a tradeoff to you? Or does it feel like a double-win?

Thousands of families will one day be living in the BelRed neighborhood. They aren't here yet to advocate for the health, safety, and comfort of the place they will call home. We should not shy away from this desperately needed infrastructure because of a few angry voices whose only connection to this place is cruising past it in their car.

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Hi, my name is Jer Schmidt, I'm a 27-year-old former Bellevue resident who left for a more walkable, bikeable, transit-oriented city. While I don't live in Bellevue anymore, I still care about it, and my friends & family still live here, so I visit multiple times a week. I want to see it improve.

I want to talk about overbuilt roads.

I shouldn't have to say this but: more space for cars is not inherently a good thing. Wide, straight roads encourage people to drive faster and more dangerously. When a road at night looks like a drag strip — wide, straight, and smooth, we can expect to get nighttime street racers (a growing problem in Bellevue). Wide roads tend to be noisy & polluted, and act as motes preventing the movement of anyone who is not in a car. We should not be prioritizing car traffic over safety, over quality of life, over our children's independence, or over the cultural & economic vitality of our neighborhoods.

When you have heard of — or even personally seen — car crashes on your own street, you're unlikely to want your kids to walk to school, and you probably won't even be comfortable walking your dog. When traffic makes your front yard noisy, you tend to isolate indoors or in the back yard. These wide roads might give us more freedom while we're behind the wheel, but they take away our freedoms the rest of the time.

Enforcement is not the answer. Enforcement treats the symptom and not the cause. As soon as you stop one reckless driver another will appear.

So, on smaller residential streets, I'm asking that we start implementing traffic calming like speed cushions, chicanes, roundabouts, and street trees. These passive solutions are already proven to reduce speeding and cut-thru traffic, while simultaneously making alternatives like walking & biking safer & more pleasant.

On some of our wider arterials, I'm asking that we work on narrowing lanes, which encourages drivers to drive slower and more carefully. Also, many of these arterials have excess capacity for the vast majority of the day, and that encourages dangerous driving during those off-peak times. Reducing the capacity will help to distribute the traffic load more evenly throughout the day so there are fewer times when the road looks like a runway. And yes, I realize that from the driver's seat we all WANT the road to look like a runway MORE often, but think about all the people who live along these roads. Think about the kids who would walk home from school if it wasn't so dangerous. Think about the people who would live healthier, more active lifestyles if they could take walks on their own street. Think about the clinic at Lake Hills Village that probably didn't want a car crashing thru the front window last Tuesday morning. About that incident — the lanes that car was driving on just before the crash are over 15 feet wide. NACTO recommends 10 feet [source below]. I'm sure this was a contributing factor and narrower lanes could have at least reduced the severity of that crash.

So to conclude: please, stop prioritizing the convenience, speed, and volume of car traffic over the safety, comfort, and quality of life of Bellevue residents. Thank you.
