Bellevue Grand Connection: I-405 Crossing – Downtown to Eastrail

Open House Engagement Summary Report

May 2, 2024 5 p.m. - 8 p.m. Bellevue Botanical Garden –12001 Main St, Bellevue, WA 98005





Project overview

Bellevue's Grand Connection program is 1.5 miles of interconnected public and spaces focused for people walking and rolling. The program begins at Meydenbauer Bay Park and continues east through downtown Bellevue across I-405 to Eastrail. The corridor will expand opportunities for those who live, work and play in Bellevue to walk, bike, roll, relax, gather, eat and shop. The signature element of the Grand Connection is the crossing over I-405—the Grand Connection Crossing, which will link downtown Bellevue to Eastrail and the Wilburton neighborhood for people traveling without a car.

The Grand Connection Crossing will start at the City Hall Plaza and end at Eastrail, ultimately tying downtown Bellevue into a 175-mile regional trail network that connects more than half a million Eastside residents.




Figure 1: Grand Connection Crossing project limits.

The Grand Connection Crossing will support the transformation of the Wilburton study



area (located at the east end of the crossing) into Bellevue's next urban mixed-use community, where improved amenities, opportunities for healthy living and economic vitality will serve the needs of a diverse and growing population. The city is aligning the updates to zoning and land use policies for the Wilburton study area with planning work for the Grand Connection Crossing.

This crossing will also be compatible with a future lid park over I-405, which is a long-range vision included in the city's <u>Grand Connection Framework Plan</u>. When complete, the crossing will enable people of all ages and abilities to access events, jobs, businesses and recreational opportunities safely and conveniently beyond the downtown core as well as create a vibrant landmark with activated outdoor spaces that celebrate and serve the community.



Open house overview

The City of Bellevue held an open house on May 2, 2024, at the Bellevue Botanical Garden from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. The city invited the public to participate through email invitations, notices on project webpages, a blurb in the May edition of Neighborhood News newsletter, social media invitation posts and in-person outreach. Attendees had the opportunity to pre-register for the event using the Eventbrite website or drop by without pre-registering.

About 136 people attended the open house, including people strolling through the Bellevue Botanical Garden and those who preregistered for the event (62 people).

The purpose of the open house was to continue to build community awareness of and interest and engagement in the Grand Connection program and the crossing, as well as expand the diversity of people who participate in the community engagement. Project staff engaged open house participants by sharing general information about the Grand Connection program and provided a deeper dive into the Grand Connection Crossing project, including: the project schedule, alignment alternatives for the crossing and initial feedback received by the community from the February online open house. Project staff also communicated future opportunities for public input.

Project staff greeted attendees at a welcome table and shared a project overview flyer before introducing an interactive, Mab Libs-style activity to gather community input. Project display boards were set up around the room and a 3D architectural model and roll plots featured the project alignment alternatives. A flyover video clip played on a loop throughout the open house to help people envision the location for the crossing. Community members could provide their comments directly to project staff, by writing on the roll plot and by filling out the Mad Libs-style form. Project partners, including Wilburton Vision Implementation, Eastrail Multi-Use Corridor and the Friends of the Grand



Connection teams shared information about their projects and initiatives with open house attendees.




Figure 4: Room layout of the open house. Display boards and the roll plot map can be found in Appendix A: Displays – Boards, Roll Plot, Mini Display.

Comments and feedback

Comments and feedback were welcomed at the open house and many of the community members chose to directly share them with project staff throughout the evening. Other ways community members could share their thoughts with project staff were in writing on the roll plot and by filling out the Mad Libs-style form.

Roll Plot

In this activity, attendees viewed an overview map of the Grand Connection Crossing, divided into five points:

- 1. **Gateway (City Hall Plaza):** West entry to the crossing at City Hall Plaza. Features could include landscape, art/cultural elements, seating, play, vending, welcome kiosk, signage and wayfinding, overhead weather protection and special events.
- 2. **West Node:** Provide access points between the crossing structure and 112th Avenue Northeast below.
- 3. **I-405 Crossing:** The Grand Connection Crossing section between the west and east nodes over I-405. May include viewpoints, overhead weather protection, separated circulation for people walking and rolling, seating, signature landscape features and details/geometry designed to abate highway noise.
- 4. **East Node:** Provide access points between the crossing structure and 116th Avenue Northeast below.



5. **Gateway (Eastrail connection):** East entry to the crossing at Eastrail. Features could include landscape, art/cultural elements, seating, play, vending, welcome kiosk, signage and wayfinding, overhead weather protection and special events.




Figure 5: Roll plot display that community members were encouraged to leave their comments on. For a high-resolution roll plot image, see Appendix A: Displays – Boards, Roll Plot, Mini Display.

Each point included example images of features and amenities that could be included in that section. After viewing these, participants answered the question, "What else would you like to do or see in this space?"

Participants shared common themes throughout all sections:

Amenities -Physical displays -Resting area -Canopy for the restrooms. reclining seats, water fountains, rain, artwork and chairs, benches signage and an water bottle and tiered fillers and ramps attractive-looking seating for accessibility sound barrier **Area for performances** and community events – live music, cultural **Bike-friendly** performances, dances Greenery amenities and an open-air market trees to provide repair station, shade, landscaping parking, and a ground cover rentable for sound barrier bike station and ramps

Taken together, the comments suggest that community members want a crossing that is accessible and usable for all people and that it offers a safe and enjoyable experience while crossing over the highway. See Appendix B: Roll Plot Comments for all comments related to specific sections.

Mad Lib-style interactive activity

The project team designed a Mad Libs-style activity to encourage community members to envision a trip on the Grand Connection and share how they plan to use it. See Appendix C: Interactive Activities for completed responses.




Figure 8: Breakout of how community members planned to use the crossing in answers submitted through the Mad Lib-inspired form.



Attendees tended to use positive words to describe how they felt after their Grand Connection experience. To describe Bellevue, they used words that evoked ideas such as soul, culture and community.

Verbal comments and feedback

Throughout the evening attendees engaged in conversation with team members. The team answered questions and shared information about the project. Overall, many open house participants expressed enthusiasm for the crossing and encouraged the city to build the crossing as quickly as possible.

The main feedback and questions team members directly received were related to:

- Cost concerns
- Long project timeline
- Integration of the crossing with a future lid park




Figure 9: Community members chatting with Grand Connection Crossing team members.

Who did we meet?

Of the 136 attendees 44 people signed up to receive project updates during sign-in at the welcome table. Attendees had the option to share if they live, work and/or play in Bellevue and of the 44 people who signed in, 40% live, 29% work and 31% play in Bellevue.






Figure 10: Breakout of how attendees who signed in define their relationship with Bellevue.

Notification strategy

Print and digital outreach

The City of Bellevue invited community participation in the open house by including information in the monthly e-newsletters *Neighborhood News*. The project team also emailed an open house invitation to 5,294 people subscribed to city project mailing lists.

The City of Bellevue posted event invitations on social media, including Facebook, Instagram, Nextdoor and X, formerly known as Twitter. The Nextdoor and X posts were translated from English into eight other languages: Chinese (simplified and traditional), Japanese, Russian, Spanish, Vietnamese, Korean and Hindi. The city posted the open house invitation on city websites, including the Economic Development Department Grand Connection program webpage, and the Transportation Department's Grand Connection Crossing project webpage. The city also posted on BellevueGrandConnection.com, a website dedicated to the Grand Connection program. In addition to the city-managed webpages, the Friends of the Grand Connection published the open house registration link to their website friendsofgrandconnection.org.

In-Person outreach

On April 27, 2024, the team tabled at Sound Transit's 2 Line Opening Ceremony, speaking to over 850 community members and sharing 300 invitations to the open house. See Appendix D: Notification Outreach for the tabling event summary.

Next steps





Alignments considered and eliminated




The purpose of the Grand Connection Crossing project is to create a safe, high comfort, transformative connector and crossing of I-405 for people walking, biking and rolling; expand the regional trail network with a connection point to the future Eastrail and enhance access to the regional light rail system and connect between downtown Bellevue and Wilburton.

The project is needed to provide:

- Safety for active transportation users
- Multimodal connectivity and access in downtown Bellevue
- Community connection as envisioned in local land use plans

The city evaluated alignment alternatives in two phases and narrowed down to four alignment alternatives. This board shows all 10 of the alignments that were considered initially and indicates which ones were dropped or carried forward.





GRAND CONNECTION CROSSING

Alignments considered in Type, Size and Location (TS&L) study



These alignment alternatives (2/3/4 & 6) meet project purpose and are flexible enough to accommodate future development, and a future lid park. Alternatives 2, 3, and 4 are generally similar, but with different strategies for connecting to Eastrail and future development. The next step is for the city to evaluate these alternatives for structure type, constructability and cost.



Alternative 2 - Simple Spans

The simplest option for the Crossing is one where the alignment is kept as far north as possible. Adjacent developments would be able to happen without extensive coordination and could be integrated even after the crossing is complete.



Alternative 4 - Public Active Edges

This is similar to Alignment 3 with building programs developed on and above the podium level. This alignment alternative assumes that the City develops up to the level where private and public developments can connect to the crossing.



Alternative 3 - Public Open Spaces

This is the same as Alignment 2 but offers more options for integration and collaboration with future developments. This option illustrates how a similar area and character could be achieved on public building direct access to the crossing in advance of a lid construction.




Alternative 6 - The Dip

This alignment drops the Crossing through the south side of the Lincoln Center parcel, allowing for the largest bridge structure over I-405.







Mad Lib-Style Activity




















Children's Activity



Northeast Bellevue. NEP kicked off in early April with a budget of \$366,000 for your area! Now is the time to submit your project ideas for how you'd like this money spent.



It's easy to share your ideas. Simply return the Postage Paid Project Idea Card each Northeast Bellevue household received in the mail or submit your ideas using the online submission form found at <u>BellevueWA.gov/nep</u>. All project ideas must be postmarked or submitted online by May 7.

West Lake Sammamish. City staff have finished the scoping phase of the numerous project ideas that were submitted for your neighborhood earlier this year.

Please plan to join city staff and your neighbors at a public open house on June 13, 6:30-8 p.m. to preview the projects that will be included on your NEP ballot and are eligible for potential funding from the \$219,000 budget allocation. A brief overview of the project scoping process and NEP voting process will be provided.

Look for printed invitations and meeting details to arrive in West Lake Sammamish area mailboxes in early June. Let us know that you plan to attend by emailing NeighborhoodOutreach@bellevuewa.gov.

The Neighborhood Enhancement Program is a city-funded program that allows residents to propose and select modest, capital projects to enhance their neighborhoods. The program rotates through the city's 14 NEP neighborhood areas over the course of seven years, serving two areas each year. The \$7 million program allocation is distributed among each of the NEP neighborhood areas, according to the number of households in each area.



Sound Transit hosted the East Link Light Rail Opening Ceremony on Saturday, April 27, 2024. Attendees joined to celebrate this expansion and were encouraged to visit resource tables set up along each station. The Grand Connection Crossing project was invited to table at this event. The Bellevue Grand Connection project staffed a booth in the City Hall Plaza to inform people about this project and invite them to the open house. The project team handed out flyers, jotted questions down, led kids through the drawing activity and presented the project model. The project team interacted and spoke with over 850 community members who attended the opening event. These attendees included people of all ages, children under the age of 18 and council members.
