Monthly Meeting Minutes April 16, 2019

Opening

The regular monthly meeting of the City of Bellevue Library Advisory Board was called to order at 5:00 PM on April 16, 2019 in the meeting room of the Newport Way Library, by Barbara Spindel, Vice President.

Public Comment Period:

No members of the public were present for the meeting.

Approval of Minutes:

Minutes for the March 2019 meeting were approved. They will be posted on the LAB One Drive and filed with the Deputy City Clerk.

Regular Business

Agenda Item 1 - Discussion with Lisa Rosenblum, KCLS Executive Director

Lisa provided historical background on the levy and the need to lift the lid as well as information about how KCLS plans to roll out the request. Main points include:

- 100% of the levy is dedicated to funding KCLS operating costs such as salaries and acquisition of library materials. Capital costs are addressed separately.
- The last lift was in 2010.
- Although revenue generated through the levy does increase over time, operating costs have been rising faster than the increases in revenue.
- Currently costs already exceed revenues. There were funds set aside early in the cycle when
 revenues still exceeded cost in anticipation of the current deficit situation, however KCLS is now at
 a point where those funds will be exhausted shortly and if there is no increase in revenue from a
 lid lift then KCLS will have to decrease operating costs in order to balance the books.
- KCLS is planning to put the lid lift on the ballot sometime in 2020.

- The current environment is likely to be tricky. Snohomish and Pierce counties just went through their own levy votes and while both ultimately passed they were very close. KCLS will be watching the upcoming Seattle ballot closely to see how their request fares.
- KCLS is currently in the process of hiring a consultant to help figure out the best timing as well as
 to help with polling to decide what to ask for/what voters will accept.
- Messaging for this type of request can be difficult because unlike a capital request where one can
 point to an obvious physical benefit to a community such as a new or renovated branch, it is harder
 for people to envision what they will "get" from funding operations.
- KCLS cannot legally act as an advocate for the initiative. They can only provide information.
- It is believed that library boards can act as advocates and therefore doing things like going before
 the city council and finding other ways of promoting the need and benefits of the lid lift amongst
 voters is an appropriate role.
- Even if the lid lift is approved in the long run KCLS will need to practice prudent fiscal management in order to maintain fiscal health.

In the follow up Q&A session:

- In response to a question about security in the Bellevue library branch Lisa indicated that although staff are empowered to deal with breaches of the behavior policy some of the larger concerns do require added security. Lisa indicated that she thought it would be better if the city supported more police presence because paying overtime to have police come in is expensive and uses up funds that she would rather see put to other uses.
- In response to a question about whether KCLS is considering doing away with late fees as some other library systems have done or are planning to do (Seattle included) Lisa indicated that she is on the fence about it. After all, current fees are quite low and the staff are good about waiving fees on a case by case basis when merited. At the same time, the fees do serve as an incentive for some people to return materials. Also, 100% of fees go back into the collection.
- In response to a question about what "good news" Lisa has experienced in her visits to all of the KCLS branches, Lisa indicated that being the keynote speaker for a recent citizen swearing in ceremony was a very emotional and moving experience.

Agenda Item 2 - Nomination for 2020 Officers

After discussion Kim Anderson accepted a nomination for President, Barbara Spindel accepted a nomination for Vice President and Gunjan Murarka accepted a nomination for Secretary to be assisted by Ankit Saraf. Election will be held at the May 21st board meeting.

Agenda Item 3 - Review Of Library Board Advisory Forum

Attendees at the forum reported that most of what was covered at the forum was about the levy and that the content was the same as what Lisa covered in our board meeting.

They also noted that overall attendance at the forum was low, with board members from only a few cities represented. It is unclear why attendance was so low but KCLS will be following up with board members

to try to understand if there are things that could be done differently to increase participation.



I have worked in public libraries for over 9 years. Before joining the King County Library System, I served in various positions at Kitsap Regional Library, and the Contra Costa County Library. I discovered a passion for working with youth while serving as the librarian for the Contra Costa County Juvenile Hall and Orin Allen Youth Rehabilitation Facility libraries. This has resulted in my being a dedicated advocate for young adults.

A program that I am working on is our ideaX S.T.E.A.M. club which will be a monthly program for teens and tweens to engage with technology and explore different areas of Science, Engineering, Art, Music and Math. The plan is that each month I will bring a different ideaX

technology kit to our program partners at the Crossroads Community Center. I will lead a group of teens and tweens through a project, or explore a new piece of equipment or technology together, co-learning through experimentation and iteration. Projects will include creating sculptures using 3D printing pens, experimenting with robotics using Lego MindStorms, and learning about astrophysics through the Kerbal Space Program game.
