Next shelter discussion

Scheduled for March 5



Mayor John Chelminiak announced during the Feb. 12 meeting that the council will begin the discussion for the permanent land

use code regulations regarding homeless shelters on March 5. The focus of the meeting will be to discuss the process, public engagement opportunities and schedule to developed permanent regulations. The council unanimously approved interim regulations last year.

The mayor also requested a compilation of information prepared to date on the seven publicly-owned sites that have been identified as potential locations for an Eastside men's emergency shelter. Seven sites have been reviewed at different times since 2016, when discussion of the potential project began. The mayor indicated that this site report, which would gather existing information into a single document and may include limited updates on the current status of the locations, is not intended to prompt a siting discussion or choice. Rather, the intent is to provide context for discussing the development of a permanent land use code amendment.

Newport Heights traffic safety improvement project open house

The City of Bellevue Neighborhood Traffic Safety Services is holding an upcoming open house to share short and long-term preliminary strategies

developed to address existing traffic safety concerns along 119th Ave SE, from Lake Heights to SE 56th, and on neighborhood streets around Newport Heights Elementary School. These strategies will focus on addressing concerns about speeding and the need for bicycling and pedestrian safety to/from school and in the neighborhood. This project is funded in part through the Neighborhood Safety, Connectivity and Congestion Levy.



“Dragons Are Your Friends” art installation at City Hall

Now through September 28



A new art installation, part of a “Dragons Are Your Friends” exhibition, was hoisted into place in February at the west entrance to City Hall. Suspended from the ceiling,

the artwork, by artist Meng Huang, features a roughly 25-foot-long dragon. The piece was made from thrown-away materials he collected from restaurants, businesses and apartments in Seattle’s Chinatown International District.

Making something out of nothing

This dragon is made of five-gallon paint barrels, aluminum rain gutters, orange traffic cones and corrugated plastic. Huang found these materials during his daily walks in and around the International District, where he lived, and then brought them back to his studio apartment to be meticulously cleaned and transformed. For Huang, who couldn’t read English when he first came to the U.S., words on consumer products became patterns. Colors and shapes of materials, rather than their original purpose, determined how they would come together to form the creatures of Huang’s imagination and hands.

Celebrating the Chinese Lunar New Year beginning Feb. 16, the installation will stay in place through Sept. 28. The exhibition is produced by the City of Bellevue Arts Program in partnership with the Wing Luke Museum of the Asian Pacific American Experience, which generously loaned the artwork.



Neighborhood Forum on fake news”, conspiracy theories & disinformation

As residents continue to navigate the growing volume of online news sources and the use of social media tools, it has become vital

to acquire skills that help identify what is reliable information and what is disinformation. Neighborhood Outreach, in partnership with the Newport Way Library will host a Bellevue Neighborhoods Forum to explore “Fake News”, Conspiracy Theories and Disinformation.

The forum will be held on the evening of March 28, with a facilitated question and answer period following. Assistant Professor, Kate Starbird, University of Washington Department of Human Centered Design and Engineering will discuss how the emergence of “fake news” and conspiracy theories can reshape our understanding of national and local events. Recent public attention and debate around “fake news” has highlighted the growing challenge of determining what is reliable information in online spaces. This is a complex problem at the intersection of technology, human thinking and social behavior. The abundance of new channels of information make us increasingly vulnerable to absorbing and spreading misinformation.

Professor Starbird will explore with us what she has learned about how online rumors spread and how online rumors are corrected during natural disasters and man-made crisis events. Recently, she has also begun exploring the propagation of disinformation through online spaces and what conspiracy theories during crisis events reveal about “fake news” and disinformation.

Kate Starbird is an Assistant Professor at the Department of Human Centered Design & Engineering at the University of Washington. Her research is situated within human-computer interaction and the emerging field of crisis informatics—the study of how information-communication technologies are used during crisis events.
