First levy projects of 2019 build on strong momentum

It will be another busy construction season for work funded by the 2016 Neighborhood Safety, **Connectivity and Congestion** Levy. Last year, a total of 13 levy projects were completed. Below

are some of the early projects that contractors are slated to work on this spring.

- Crosswalk, bicycle and pedestrian improvements on 112th Avenue Northeast: After a winter hiatus, construction is resuming on 112th Avenue Northeast, from Northeast 12th Street north to the city limits. Crews will activate previously installed flashing beacons at mid-block crossing between Northeast 12th and 24th streets. They will also add bike lanes, add pedestrian paths and repair sidewalks from Northeast 24th Street to SR-520.
- Sidewalk, traffic circle and crosswalk upgrades on 158th Place Southeast: Work is projected to begin in April to add a curb, gutter and a sixfoot wide sidewalk on the east side of to 158th Place Southeast, from Main Street to Southeast Sixth Street. Crews also will rebuild a traffic circle at Southeast Fourth Street, add a pedestrianactivated flashing crosswalk on Lake Hills Boulevard at 159th Place Southeast and replace a water main.



Crosswalk and sidewalk improvements for 156th Avenue Northeast: Construction is expected to start later this spring to add a new mid-block crossing, with a flashing beacon, on 156th Avenue Northeast at Northeast First Street. Also planned is a new sidewalk from Northeast First Place to Northeast First Street and improving existing mid-block crossings at Northeast Fourth and Sixth streets with new flashing beacons.

Neighborhood Enhancement Program coming to Lake Hills area with over \$500K for improvements

The Neighborhood

Enhancement Program (NEP) is a \$5 Million, city-funded capital improvements program that allows residents to propose and select projects that improve their neighborhood's



quality of life and enhance its character. The program rotates through Bellevue's 14 NEP Neighborhood Areas, serving two areas each year. Since 2015, NEP has funded projects in the Eastgate/Factoria, Cougar Mountain/Lakemont, West Lake Sammamish, Northeast Bellevue, Bridle Trails, Northwest Bellevue and Downtown/BelRed areas. This month, the NEP process will launch in Lake Hills, with a budget allocation of over \$500,000 for enhancements.

A Kick-Off meeting will be held on Apr. 16, 6:30-8:00 p.m., at the Sammamish High School Library, (100 140th Ave SE). City staff will provide a brief overview of the program guidelines and schedule, answer questions and invite residents to share, discuss and submit project ideas. Following the meeting, each household in Lake Hills will receive a prepaid NEP Project Request Form in the mail. All residents in the Lake Hills Area are encouraged to use this form or the online project request form on the NEP website and to submit as many project ideas by May 31.

Examples of past NEP projects throughout the city include: art elements, crosswalk improvements, trail connections, street lighting, play structures and streetscape improvements.

When cultural differences make it hard to communicate

"My neighbor keeps saying 'yes' when I ask him to trim the tree, but it seems like he really means 'no.""

"She is very pushy and demanding!"

The way we say and hear things is often as important as what we say. The issue is seldom just the tree blocking



our view or the poorly parked car. Increasingly, cultural differences and potential bias underlie many of the conflicts that conciliators in the city's Conflict Resolution Center handle. In our diverse city, it can be easy for people from "We cultures" and "I cultures" to misunderstand each other.

I and We cultures

Social scientists have identified China, India and countries in Southeast Asia, Africa and South America as "We cultures." Conversely, experts have dubbed the United States, Russia, Canada, Australia and European countries as "I cultures."

So, what does that mean? I culture societies tend to be focused on individual goals, rights and freedoms. They are direct in communication and say what they want. Difference of opinion, for instance, is something to negotiate openly. They value direct and "efficient" conversation that gets to the point.

We culture people tend to be focused on the collectivethe people who make up their culture-and they tend to stick together. Outward conflict is avoided and saying directly what you want is seen as rude and pushy. People in We cultures use body language and vocal tone to express a preference, while they still show deference to the group.

None of us are completely "I" or "We." Instead we mostly communicate one way or the other.

Crossing the Cultural Divide

If you understand your neighbor's underlying communication style, you are more likely to be receptive to what he or she says. The more that people in the community can learn about each other, the sooner these cultural clashes can be avoided.

If you're from an I culture, it can be helpful to make a connection with your neighbor through small talk before telling them what you want. Read their body language and tone of voice to understand how they really feel about a proposal.

If you're from a We culture, sometimes it's OK to say explicitly what you want and why. Know that I culture people will not be offended if you say "No."

A majority of the conflicts that the Bellevue Conflict Resolution Center helps people with contain some element of cultural misunderstanding. Many conflicts begin with an assumption that the actions or words of another have ill intent. In general, it is helpful to review any negative assumptions when interpreting what your neighbor, who may be from a different culture, is thinking or doing. When in doubt, assume that they mean well.




